**Making Onion Machine**—Students of the machine shop course at the senior high school are making an onion machine. One of the large growers in the Lake Labish region, E. E. The onion machine is used to cut the tops off onions, which usually is done by the grower as he sells a carload. It is driven by a five horse power gas engine mounted on a wagon truck. The students are building the entire machine, at a cost of \$250 to the grower, the shop paying cost of materials from this sum.
