Hobson, in Los Angeles, according to news received here. Mrs. Gill was a resident of Salem for many years. Funeral services will be held in Eugene Saturday afternoon.

Bootlegger Jailed—"Charley" Johnson of West Woodburn was arrested Thursday and brought before Justice of the Peace Small on a charge of selling liquor.
