Lecture Will Be Given Next Friday
WILLAMETTE Auxiliary of the First Presbyterian church is issuing invitations to an evening in the Orient, on a personally conducted tour by Miss Sara Wrenn, in the social hall of the First Presbyterian church Friday, November 16, at 8 o'clock.
 Following work as a special agent of the War Labor Board in New England and Atlantic states during the Great War, Miss Wrenn went to the Orient spending a year and a half in Japan on the staff of the Japan Advertiser, the largest foreign newspaper in the Far East. Later, Miss Wrenn visited Korea at the time of the revolt of the Land of the Morning Calm against Japan, reaching Peking at the height of China's worst famine of many years. Within a month after her arrival at Peking, she was made a trip by cart, afoot, mule-back and chair, through the three provinces of Chihbei, Honan, and Shantung, investigating the horrors of the famine for the Philadelphia Ledger syndicate.
 In her capacity as news writer, Miss Wrenn had more untiring and interesting experience during

the three years she was in the Orient, then often encountered by foreigners, especially women. Miss Wrenn will show many beautiful pictures and will give an illustrated lecture. Proceeds of the lecture will be used by the auxiliary for their church activities.
