Noted Women Will Speak at AAUW Luncheon

PROF. Emma H. Gunther, of Columbia University, field secretary of the Million Dollar Fellowship Fund of the American Association of University Women, will address the members of the Salem Branch of the A. A. U. W. on November 17 at 12:30 o'clock at the regular monthly luncheon at the Gray Belle.

Professor Gunther will deal with the need of more fellowships for women, a subject which she is thoroughly equipped to discuss, having recently returned from Madrid, Spain, where she represented the American Association of University Women at the Council Meeting of the International Federation of University Women, a meeting at which the foremost interest was more-fellowship-for-women.

America had unmistakable evidence of the need for more fellowships when one hundred and sixty-six women, each one well qualified, applied for the dozen fellowships the American Association of University Women awarded in 1927.

It was at their National Convention in 1927 that the vote to raise a million dollars for fellowships was passed.

Professor Gunther is well known for her work as exchange professor in China. She lectured in Peking, Nanking, Shanghai and many important Chinese cities. She was a member of the International Relations Committee of the A. A. U. W. for six years, and is identified with all the activities of the association. Professor Gunther was also the president of the Faculty Club of Columbia University.

At the same luncheon meeting, K. Inoue, consul of Japan, in Oakland, will discuss International relations as they have to do with our own country. This will be an outstanding affair, and men or women of Salem who wish to hear Mr. Inoue are invited to the address at 1:45 o'clock.
