Testimony Made Public Upon Arraignment of District Attorney

Insincere Prosecution in Julian Case Said to Have Netted Profit

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 20 .-AP)-Testimony which plumbed the depths of the administration of the Los Angeles county district attorney's office under the veteran prosecutor Asa Keyes, taken secretly by a grand jury, was released today at the arraignment of Keyes on bribery charges which

grew out of the investigation. Harold L. Davis, chief deputy under Keyes at the time of the prosecution of the leaders of the Julian Petroleum company financial fiasco, told the jury that he broke with Keyes because of what he described as "insincere prosecution" of the Julian defendants, all of whom were acquitted after trial in state courts. Four of the promoters of the oil company later were convicted in federal court on charges of using the mail

o defraud. The information revealed that Davis voluntarily appeared before the grand jury to testify concerning his break with Keyes, and that he denied charges made by Milton Pike and Joseph Sherman, workmen in the Getzoff Tailor shop, that he was to "get a cut" of the money paid in "fixing" the Jul-
