How To Achieve Beauty

Heat the oil—either balsam oil or olive oil is good—(the former is more easily washed out)—in a little enamel cup—about two tablespoonfuls of the oil is plenty. Separate your hair and massage the oil well into the parts. Reheat if necessary. If possible, retain overnight. Binding your hair up in a lightweight towel. Shampoo thoroughly, using three or four lathers and gallons of hot water in the morning.

Try to give your head a "breath of fresh air" every now and then. Tight hats are bad for scalp circulation, and consequently a little dangerous in their tendency to discourage new and vigorous hair growth. Go without a hat all you can. It will aid immeasurably in the fight that this "cloche-d," "turban-ed" generation must wage against baldness!
