## J. S. Landers Heads Month Chapter of Nation Wide Organization

MONMOUTH, Ore., Nov. 23.—Initial organization of a local chapter of the state and national council for prevention of war was held at the community house here Wednesday night. The Rev. L. L. Daily, minister of the Baptist church, presided and after all had joined in singing America, Rev. L. W. Willard, Evangelical pastor, led in prayer. # DESERT SCoured IN SEARCH OF BANDITS

JORNADO DEL MUERTO, New Mexico, Nov. 23.—(AP)—Once again grim desert possemen are scouring this desert, named by the Spaniards of centuries ago "The Journey of Death"—Jornado del Muerto—and once again their quarry is a band of horse thieves, seeking escape by this route to the safety of the border and Old Mexico.

For the past 24 hours possemen headed by Sheriff Lon Dauley, have searched through this region for a band of Mexicans and Americans, which sacked ranch houses of guns, ammunition, clothing and provisions during a several day orgy of banditry.

Far from any towns, without communication except by messenger, the depredations of the band did not become known until yesterday when the posse started its hunt.

All crossings of the Rio Grande are guarded by possemen and the entire white sands district is being combed for the robbers.

# M'NARY WANTS TO GET FARM AID SOON

WASHINGTON, Nov. 23.—(AP)—A resolution proposing that the proceeds from the sale of four million dollars worth of supplies to France during the world war should be used in building and repairing rural roads in the adopted Thursday by the national senate.

"This material that was sold to France would have been used in this country for constructing roads if we had kept it," said A. S. Goss of Seattle, Wa., in introducing the resolution.

Senator McNary of Oregon, in addressing the morning business session, declared that he was in favor of attempting to get farm relief legislation enacted in the regular short session of congress.

He added that if its passage was found impossible, a special session should be called to deal with the problem.

If this thing is delayed until spring any legislation that congress passes will not go into effect until 1930 and that is too late," he said.

# JOHN BARRYMORE IS PUT IN 'POOR LIGHT'

## Father of Bride-to-be Indicates Displeasure at Talk Going Rounds

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 23.—(AP)—Maurice Costello, one-time film star, and father of Dolores whom John Barrymore intends to wed, tonight said that the "talk" going the rounds of Hollywood intimating that Barrymore has not received a divorce from his second wife "certainly doesn't put any one in a very good light."

Hollywood was mildly surprised when the famous stage and screen actor filed intentions to wed Miss Costello, amused at the report that he was not yet divorced from Blanche Oelrich, and thrown into great excitement when a "mystery" woman telephoned a warning that Barrymore's marital status should be investigated before a license was issued to the marriage license bureau here today.

"I think he ought to clear up the situation," Miss Costello's father declared, frankly troubled. Meanwhile Barrymore himself had given every indication that he would make no further comment on any phase of the intimated tangle.

The statement issued by Barrymore at that time was in the form required by California law, and must be filed three days in advance of the issuance of a marriage license. It laconically set forth that John Barrymore intended to marry Dolores Costello, and did so marry Mrs. Leonard Thomas, better known under the pen name of Michael Strange, had secured a divorce from him.
