Silverton Groups Will Enter-tain Oregon Circuit This Week End

SILVERTON, Ore., Nov. 26.—(Special)—Preparations are going forward for a big convention at Trinity church of Silverton during the Thanksgiving week end, November 29 to December 2. The junior and senior Luther Leagues of the church will act as hosts to the Oregon Circuit Leagues in their annual convention. Edwin Tingstad, principal of the Silverton high school, is president of the Oregon Circuit.

At least 50 delegates, besides a large number of other visitors, are expected here for the week end. Cities represented will be Clatsop, Centralia, La Center, Brush Prairie, and Longview, Wash.; and from Oregon are Astoria, Portland, Canby, Woodburn, Monitor and Eugene.

Miss Esther Towe, president of the Trinity senior league, and Miss Cora Goplerud, president of the junior league, assisted by the Rev. H. L. Foss, pastor of Trinity church, have charge of the local arrangements. Sessions of the convention will be held in the auditorium of Trinity church. A. Tingstad, president of Pacific Lutheran college at Parkland, Wash., and the Rev. M. A. Christenson of Astoria. Immanuel and Trinity choirs of Silverton, Central Lutheran choir of Portland, and a joint choir from Woodburn and Monitor will also furnish numbers.

Three Rural Mail Routes Extended Postmaster Says

Three rural routes, numbers three, five and six, will be extended December 1, according to announcement made Monday by John Barz, postmaster, following orders for the extensions from the federal department.
Route three, on which Lyman McDonald is carrier, will be extended eight-tenths of a mile, including four-tenths of a mile east from Browning's corner and retracing in the Salem Heights district. This will make the total mileage of the route 22.8.
Route five will be 31.20 miles long under the new ruling, one mile being added which will serve the district five-tenths of a mile south from the Weasel corner with a retracing. The route serves south 22nd street and Turner road, with James S. Albert, carrier.
Route six will be extended 1.5 miles from near Roth's corner beyond the cemetery, making the complete mileage 20.7. Oratio L. Fisher is the carrier.

PASTOR GIVES FINAL SERMON

The Rev. J. A. Bennett Closes Ministry of Nearly Twelve Years

SILVERTON, Ore., Nov. 26.—(Special)—The Rev. J. A. Bennett, who has been pastor of the First Christian church of Silverton for the past eleven years and nine months, gave his farewell sermon Sunday morning to a well filled house.
The Rev. Mr. Bennett took for his topic "A Program of Life" and advised his listeners not to be dissatisfied for there is hope for the disheartened who are never satisfied until they have done the best they can do. He admonished them to forget the past; to press forward, as David Livingston said, "Anywhere—but forward." "There are too many," the Rev. Mr. Bennett said, "without an aim. They live in the past."
Will Seek Health
The Rev. and Mrs. Bennett will live at Silverton, where for the present he will devote his time to getting well. He has suffered from rheumatism for the past few years.

During his pastorate here he has delivered 1254 sermons and addresses, conducted 109 weddings and 319 funerals. He has had 446 additions to the congregation and 271 baptisms. The present parsonage was also built during his time at Silverton. Its cost was about \$7000.
