### Deadly Medford Attack Is Too Much For Benson

PORTLAND, Oregon, Nov. 29. (AP)—The Medford high school football team defeated Benson Tech, Portland champions, 39 to 0, before a crowd estimated at 18,000, here today.

The southern Oregonians scored two touchdowns in the first half, the first on a long forward pass from Melvin to Bowerman, and the second on a plunge through tackle by Melvin. Both were scored in the first quarter, and one of the extra points was converted with a forward pass. With this lead the Medford team faced an aroused Benson Tech team, and twice turned back the Orange tide within its own twenty yard line. In the second quarter...

through the heavy Benson line. Medford made a total of 495 yards from scrimmage, to 195 for Benson. Benson opened an aerial attack in the second quarter, which was smothered and in the third quarter, failed to make first down once.

In the second half, both teams made many substitutions.

They moved to Oregon 49 years ago, settling on Salem Prairie where they lived for two years, then moved to Smithfield in Polk county where they resided for seven years. They then moved to Falls City where they have lived ever since. The funeral was to be held at the Henkle parlors Wednesday afternoon at 2:00 o'clock. She leaves four sons and three daughters: Oliver E. Dennis of Dallas, William F. Dennis of Portland, Louis J. Dennis of Falls City, Elbert Dennis of Falls City, Mrs. Ida Crowley of Monmouth, Mrs. Lenny Ward of Portland, Mrs. Edith Henney of Oakland, Calif.; one sister, Mrs. Lew Wheeler of Newport, Ore.; and one brother, Henry Brown of Portland. She also leaves 15 grandsons, three granddaughters and ten great grandchildren.

### HEALTH RECORD OF OREGON STRESSED

Chambers of commerce and other civic organizations, while advertising the physical and material attractions of the state, have been negligent in calling attention to one of the state's greatest assets—the good health of the people. Such is the statement in a new bulletin from the state board of health to which the Marion county child health association calls attention.

"Every chamber of commerce in Oregon should carry on its letterhead this legend: 'Oregon has the lowest infant death rate in the United States,'" the bulletin states, with the addition that "that is legitimate advertising."

The bulletin says further: Diphtheria in Oregon has decreased one half. Is that not worth while advertising? Facilities for the care of the tuberculous have also increased. Water and milk supplies in Oregon are constantly being improved. General sanitation is advancing.

Is it not a wonderful offer to make the expectant mother that in no other state in the union are the chances of her baby surviving greater than in our own state of Oregon? Let every chamber of commerce carry on its letterhead this legend: 'Oregon has the lowest infant death rate in the United States,'" the bulletin states, with the addition that "that is legitimate advertising."

It was the veteran quarterback who led the first Syracuse touchdown in the third period after Columbia had drawn first blood a moment before but he was ably seconded in that 35 yard scoring march down the field by halfback Warren Stevens. In the fourth period Stevens put the game on by seeking right end for a second Orange touchdown.

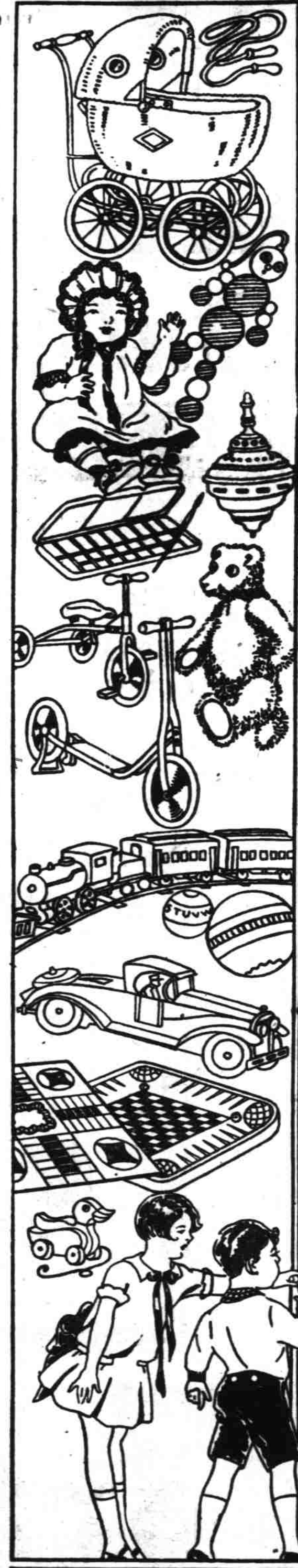
