responsibility, with the exception of the one serving Silverton, where the school board is contributing toward the salary. Salem has three nurses, two of whom the city and school are maintaining.

Dr. Warner said, in referring to the original agreement preliminary to the location of the demonstration in this county: "The understanding before the demonstration was invited to come here was that the city, the school board and the county work toward assuming responsibility for a permanent health service on a basis similar to that carried on in Clackamas, Coos, Jackson, Douglas and Klamath counties where the Rockefeller Foundation carries on its program."

She pointed out that the total budget for the county to maintain its own unit after 1930 will be \$25,000, approximately one-third of which the county would be expected to provide.

Conferees Consider Court Attitude

Following the ultimatum from the east, conferees have been held by the Public Health association, the Marion county health unit, and representatives of the city council and school board with the county court but as yet no action to change the budget appropriation has been definitely made.

In a letter to the Commonwealth headquarters under date of November 7, 1928, the late W. H. Downing wrote the following as judge of Marion county: "I am in hearty sympathy with the county health work and will use my influence in the future towards establishing a county health unit."

John W. Porter, then county commissioner-elect, wrote the same time: "As county commissioner-elect I can assure you of my support in all your county health work."

A total of 139 deaths resulted from influenza in 77 cities during the week ending December 8, the bureau reported from information submitted by telegram to the bureau of census. This compared with 43 deaths from the disease in the same cities during the week ending November 3. The general death rate for the U. S. for the week was 13.3 per 100,000 population compared with 11.9 for the corresponding period of last year.

The bureau said that some authorities attribute the rise in the general rate to the increase in deaths from influenza but it declined to comment.

The total of more than 200,000 cases for the country estimated yesterday was more than borne out by today's reports, the bureau said.

The 40,510 cases are "not more than one-fifth of the cases actually existing," it was said, "indicating a real total of at least 202,550."

ACTION DEMANDED IN LIQUOR SCANDAL

KANSAS CITY, Dec. 13.—(AP)—Telegrams requesting immediate action on the liquor situation in Kansas City, characterized by local and federal officials alike as a "wide open town" were dispatched late today to prohibition officials in Washington and to Governor Sam A. Baker of Missouri by the Law Enforcement association, a civic body. The action followed assertions that at least 3,000 liquor selling places were operating in Kansas City and charges of laxity and police protection which were brought to the

fore on Monday by the act of a modern Carrie Nation in wrecking a neighborhood saloon with an axe.

Police place the onus on loopholes in the law and on the prosecutor's office saying that a handful of convictions had been obtained out of 3,000 arrests, and the prosecutor's office passed it back to police charging slipshod methods of obtaining evidence.

W. Harold Lane, chief dry enforcement officer here, and Roscoe C. Patterson, United States district attorney, told Lincoln R. Toyne, chief of police, that they would cooperate and prosecute liquor cases in federal court if police would make cases which would stand up in federal court and obtain evidence and make arrests in an approved manner.
