If his plans mature, he hopes to go into China for an extended visit in that country. A trip through the Mediterranean countries and into Asia Minor is also contemplated for spring. Mr. Barnes went to Europe more than two years ago. He has had many vivid experiences during his stay there.

Celebration for Grimes—County School Superintendent Fulkerson has received an invitation from L. J. Dr. Brunk Here Again—Dr. E. H. Brunk, dental supervisor with the Marion county child health demonstration, is back in his office at the health unit this week, following several weeks spent in Roseburg, where he made a survey of dental needs among the school children of that city and Douglas county. He reports that as soon as the new Douglas county court house is finished, a dental clinic will be housed there. Dr. Brunk examined 3,000 school children in 94 grade schools there, 63 per cent of whom needed dental work. Five per cent more of the children examined in the south needed attention to the teeth than was found among Marion county children.

Scientists Meet—Members of the Willamette university science club performed the famous Foucault experiment at their meeting Wednesday night. This experiment is a proof of the daily rotation of the earth on its axis, and was performed in the attic of Eaton Hall.

Driver Arrested—Charged with failing to put out his hand before making a turn, Emil Schreiber was arrested and brought into justice court here Wednesday following an accident in which his car and one driven by Linn Smith were involved. Schreiber was released on \$100 bail.

WEST SALEM MAN'S ABSENCE MYSTERY

Quiet efforts of West Salem and Salem people to learn the whereabouts of W. J. Kibbe Wednesday brought to light Mr. Kibbe's disappearance from his home there, presumably last Friday night. Mr. Kibbe has operated the Kingwood service station there since last July. His disappearance was first noted Saturday morning when the service station was found locked. Keys to the station were found on the steps of the house next to it, where Mr. Kibbe lived.

Friends of Mr. Kibbe could assign no reason for his dropping from sight unless he had grown melancholy over the loss of his wife before he came here and the death of his son in a motorcycle accident in New York several months ago. Persons acquainted with his business affairs say there was no financial strain.

Theories that he had taken any action to leave this part of the country were scouted when it was discovered his trunk and other personal belongings had been removed from the home. Whether he decided to return to the east or west south is a matter of conjecture.

He is a brother of F. D. Kibbe of Salem.

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TESTS ATTEST WATER PURITY

Vegetable Growth, Natural to Water Supply, Cause of Odor and Taste

Odor and unpleasant taste in the water supply of Salem does not in the least affect its absolute purity, according to tests which have been made by Portland laboratories for the Oregon-Washington Water Service Co., that company announced Wednesday.

"During each summer season," J. W. Helwick, vice-president, declares, a supply such as ours which is exposed to sunlight, germinates a certain type of vegetable growth commonly called algae. This gets into the pipes and attaches itself and remains for some time, depending on the temperature of the water.

"Our long, hot summer has caused an excessive amount of this algae and our recent rather sharp cold snap has changed the temperature of the water sufficiently to cause this algae to let loose at a more rapid rate than usual and has caused the change in taste. Where there are hot and cold water installations the heated water will cause an odor."

"The water supply is exactly the same as it has always been and the treatment is carried on in exactly the same manner. It is simply a condition that maintains each season in a varying degree, depending on the previous summer season. This disturbance is perfectly harmless and will not obtain long, as we are daily flushing our mains to get rid of it as rapidly as possible. Daily tests are made and these tests show the water pure and safe, more than meeting both state and United States government health requirements."

Youth Defended By Dr. Landers In Rotary Talk

Landers, president of the Monmouth Normal school, told the Salem Rotary club at its luncheon meeting Wednesday. Household Hints

MENU HINT
Royal Hash—Mashed Turnips Watercress Salad Chocolate Marshmallow Pudding Tea or Coffee

Here is a new way to make an old dish attractive and to finish the leftover broiled steak. The canned mushrooms may be used in place of fresh.

Today's Recipes
Royal Hash—Mashed potato, one-half cup cold, cooked, diced meat; one-fourth or one-half pound mushrooms, two tablespoons butter, one tablespoon flour, one-half cup stock or one-half teaspoon meat extract, dissolved in one-half cup hot water. Grease a large pie plate, and on it make a ring of mashed potato. Prepare the mushrooms and break in small pieces. Melt butter in small saucepan, and when hot add mushrooms and cook over a low flame until tender. Sprinkle with flour and stir until it is mixed with the fat and juice in the pan. Add the stock and seasoning. Cook until thick. Add the meat and pour mixture into the center of the potato ring. Cover with buttered crumbs and bake until crumbs and potato are brown.

Chocolate Marshmallow Pudding—Two tablespoons quick cooking tapioca, one-fourth teaspoon salt, three tablespoons cocoa, one square chocolate, three-fourths tablespoon butter, two eggs one teaspoon vanilla, one-third cup sugar, one pint scalded milk. Mix tapioca, salt, half sugar and cocoa. Add hot milk, stir and return to double boiler and cook until tapioca is tender, then add butter. Separate the eggs, beat the whites stiff, then the yolks slightly with the remainder of the sugar. Pour mixture slowly, on the yolks and sugar, stirring constantly; return to double boiler and cook until thick. To the stiffly-beaten egg whites add a little of the hot tapioca mixture, folding it in carefully, then add the remainder, add flavoring and cool. When cold add marshmallows cut in pieces. Serve very

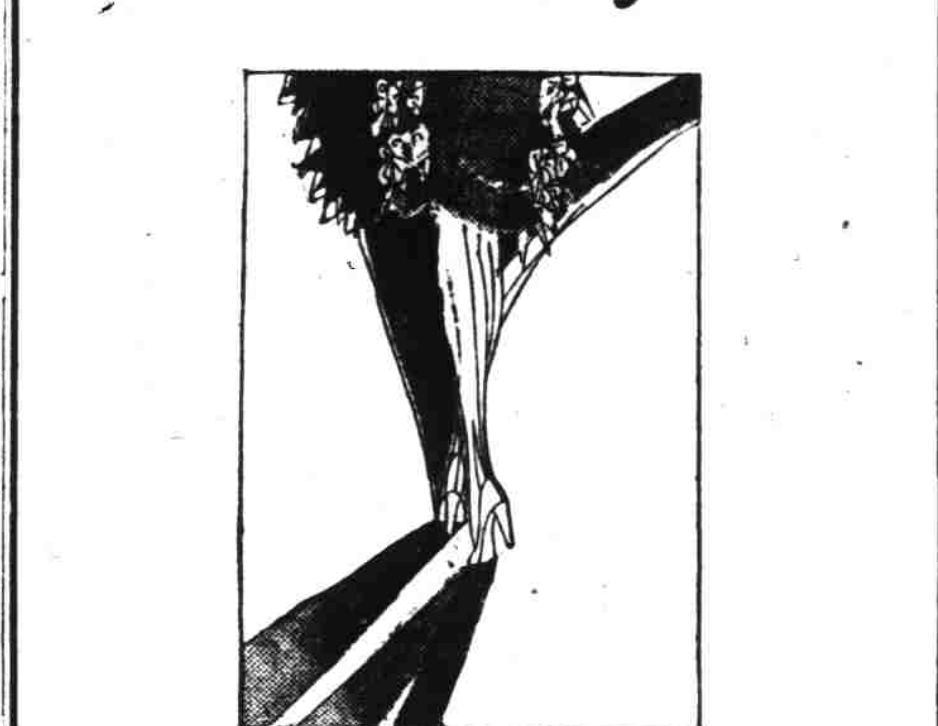
