WOMAN LAWYER IS SOUGHT BY GROUP

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 12.—(AP)—The Los Angeles Bar association today started a nation wide hunt for Mrs. Margaret D. Yale, 45, widely known California lawyer, who has been missing since October 30 when she left the Paro, Wyo., home of her brother, William F. Dickenson, to return here.

Mrs. Yale, who had been in ill health, is feared by relatives to have suffered a breakdown or an attack of aphasia and become lost among strangers.

The search was revealed when a petition was filed in probate court asking for the appointment of a guardian over Mrs. Yale's property, which was declared to be of large value and needing immediate attention. Hearing on the petition was set for February 27 in the hope that the missing woman will return or be located.

Mrs. Yale is the widow of Dr. Robert Yale of Burbank, Calif., who died several years ago. Several months ago she went to Denver to visit a sister and from there to visit her brother. Nothing has been heard of her since she left the Wyoming city.

Diet and Health

SHAKING PALSY SELDOM ATTACKS YOUNG PEOPLE
Paralysis Agitans (Parkinson's Disease)

For in such a case both have the same father or mother.

WOULD a girl of 20 have that awful disease called Paralysis Agitans? Are not constantly unsteady hands and trembly nerves all through the body symptoms of this disease? I have been this way for a year or so. A terrific nervous strain, over a period of six years or more could bring on this disease, couldn't it? Please answer in the column as soon as possible. M.

I don't believe you have Paralysis Agitans. M., because in the first place it is very rare in young people, and in the second place, the tremor of paralysis agitans (also called shaking palsy) is not like an unsteadiness which many people have—but it consists of rhythmic movements, like partially opening and closing the hands, or turning the hand. The movements are usually within narrow limits and the thumb and fingers may rub together as in counting coins; and one of the chief characteristics, points of the tremor of this disease is that it continues during rest and is present whether the patient is lying down or standing or whether his hands are supported or hanging. Sometimes the hand and forearm may really shake. There are other symptoms which also point to the disease—the speech is apt to be affected, the gait, the facial expression, etc.

It is not known what causes paralysis agitans. It seems to be thought to be due to syphilis or chronic alcoholism, but many cases show no history of this disease. Whatever it is, it causes a profound disturbance in the brain or spinal cord. Physical injury with its psychic shock, some of the infectious diseases, notably encephalitis lethargica (sleeping sickness) prolonged anxiety, emotional excesses, fear, grief and anger are mentioned among the predisposing causes. It is possible that the disease may eventually be found to be a deficiency disease—that is, one due to a deficient diet, for a prolonged incorrect diet certainly will cause a deterioration of the nervous system.

Treatment of Paralysis Agitans: As the cause is not known, there is no specific treatment, outside of the malarial treatment which is being tried out now. I told you of that in an article a short time ago. In the severe cases at the Montefiore Hospital it is found that baths kept at body temperature are markedly helpful. Some physicians have noted improvement in their cases after a series of slow exercises with arms, legs and toes, 15 minutes, two or three times a day.

It is a sad thing that a girl of only 20 should be so subject to a terrific nervous strain for six or more years. Is there no way that you can escape from this bondage? If it is your home surroundings, can't you leave home and go to work some place? Needless to say, you need an examination by a competent physician. M., a hygienic mode of living, with the correct diet, and freedom from nervous strain.
