### REICHSTAG STAGES MEETING AT NIGHT

BERLIN, Dec. 17.—(AP)—For the first time since 1902 the Reichstag convened early Sunday morning in a midnight deliberation which was dubbed the "Seltzer water session." This was caused by the order of President Paul Loebe, to prevent the members from becoming drowsy from consumption of alcoholic beverages, for the Reichstag lunch room to dispense no beers or wines after the meeting convened.

The session became necessary before the economic party, after failure to obtain additional representation on certain committees, voted against a third reading of the supplementary budget bill immediately after the second reading on Friday. The Reichstag rules specify that if there is no objection to an immediate third reading the bill cannot be taken up again until the third day. Since the Reichstag wishes to adjourn for Christmas holidays, it decided to hold its final meeting of the year five minutes after midnight this morning.

The body presented an unusual picture, many members having first attended social functions and appearing in full dress or Tuxedos. Others made no secret that they were unused to late hours. In the cloak rooms there was much banter of the "Americanization" of the Reichstag by President Loebe, who was reported to have returned from the United States a strong believer in "dry" sessions.

### HOUSE GETS SENATE BOULDER DAM BILL

WASHINGTON, Dec. 17.—(AP)—The senate Boulder Dam bill reached the house Saturday and immediately there began a buzz of committee and cloak room discussion as to prospects of early house approval.

Some proponents of the measure, which was passed by the house last session, regarded the revisions effected by the senate as changing the general purport of the measure from the form in which the house approved it. They said it might be possible to obtain house concurrence without sending the measure to conference. Others refused to comment until they had had an opportunity to study the amended measure.

### Order is Filed In Dallas Case Against Gates

DALLAS, Ore., Dec. 17.—(Special)—An order in the case of the City of Dallas vs. H. V. Gates was filed in the office of County Clerk H. G. Black Saturday, requiring the city to make its complaint more definite. The order was handed down by Judge Beard. It stated in part: "That the complaint of plaintiff be made more definite and certain by alleging in paragraph XIII showing whether or not the plaintiff city has available cash on hand and is therefore able to pay the award arrived at by the arbitrators mentioned in said complaint and ordinances; or if the plaintiff city does not have available cash on hand and on that account is not now able to pay an award so made, then the plaintiff shall make its complaint more definite and certain by alleging sufficient facts to show whether the plaintiff has lawful power and legal authority to issue and deliver to the above named defendant sufficient amount of warrants or bonds with which to obtain sufficient money to pay the award."

The city was given until December 20 to file an amended complaint.
