DRY LAW BEING FLOUTED, CLAIM

Woodburn W. C. T. U. Asks Council to Take Action Against Liquor Sale

WOODBURN, Ore., Dec. 20.—(Special)—Complaint that the prohibition laws are being violated extensively in Woodburn, was made in a petition signed by 20 members of the local W. C. T. U. and read at the city council meeting Wednesday night. The petition asked the council to take action to prevent sale of liquor. Fred Felkert, assistant division engineer of the Southern Pacific, appeared before the council and asked for modification of the city ordinance which limits trains to a speed of 10 miles an hour within

the city limits. He recommended raising the limit to 25 miles an hour to conform with those of other Willamette valley towns. The council deferred action on the matter until some future meeting. W. J. Wilson requested that a sidewalk be built from Brown street to his home on Wilson street. This was referred to the street committee and street commission for investigation as to cost. Fund Use Disputed. Members of the fire department were at the meeting and discussed disposal of funds of the department with the council. A misunderstanding between the two organizations recently caused heated argument and discussion between the groups regarding the purchase of fire equipment. A motion was passed to require all appointive city officers to attend council meetings in the future. City Dump Discussed. Conditions at the city dump came up for some discussion.
