Fight Promoter Near Death

GROWS WORSE Famous Fight Promoter Said Near Death From Acute **Appendicitis**

Second Operation Performed in Desperate Attempt to Save Life

MIAMI, Fla., Jan. 5 .- (AP) Tex Rickard, president of Madison Square Garden, lay near death at Allison hospital, Miami Beach, late last night. The famous promoter, who underwent an operation Tuesday evening for appendicitis, suddenly took a decided turn for the worst at midnight and physicians worked to save his life.

At 12:45 a. m., Mr. Rickard was gradually growing weaker. after a second operation had been performed late last night. The statement was made at the hospital by authority of Dr. H. E. Adkins, who is in charge of the case. Dr. Atkins performed the first operation upon Rickard Tuesday night, removing the appendix. Rickard had been taken to the hospital Tuesday afternoon after
