OREGON FACULTY MEMBER PASSES

EUGENE, Jan. 4.—(AP)—Frederick George Young, 71, dean of the school of sociology at the University of Oregon, died at his home here today. For 23 years Dean Young was affiliated with the University faculty and for 30 years he was secretary of the Oregon State Historical association. Dr. Young for several years was secretary of the Oregon Conservation commission. He was editor of the quarterly Journal of the Oregon Historical society and of the Commonwealth Review. He edited a book, "Success of the History of Oregon," and was the author of "Financial History of Oregon," and many pamphlets and statistical works. He also edited the Oregon section of the encyclopedia Britannica. Dr. Young was born at Burnett, Wis., and was graduated from Johns Hopkins university in 1886, receiving the honorary degree of Doctor of Laws from the University of Oregon in 1920.

HOOVER PLANS TOUR AMONG WEST INDIES

Havana, Port-Au-Prince, Santo Domingo City, San Juan, and, if the Virgin islands are included in the tour, at St. Thomas.

Today, after almost perfect weather all the way from Rio de Janeiro, the Utah encountered overcast skies and a rain squall, with a 40-knot blow during the forenoon. There was a choppy sea, which was made more difficult to take some spray on the starboard side and over the bow.

Battleship Approaches Destination Steadily
The Utah maintained her speed, however, and by mid-afternoon was between Bermuda and the coast of Georgia, approximately 550 miles from Hampton Roads. The prospects were still good for her arrival at Old Point Comfort on scheduled time at 8 o'clock Sunday morning.

Packing is still going forward apace, with passageways and main deck cluttered up with boxes and trunks belonging to members of the Hoover party.

Newspaper correspondents on board the battleship have been greatly surprised by the speed and facility with which press dispatches have been handled by navy radio operators using a special high frequency radio set installed on board the Utah before she went south to pick up the Hoover party at Montevideo. Since December 18, with the exception of the three days spent by the party at Rio De Janeiro, the Utah radio men have handled a total of 71,778 words of outgoing press messages.

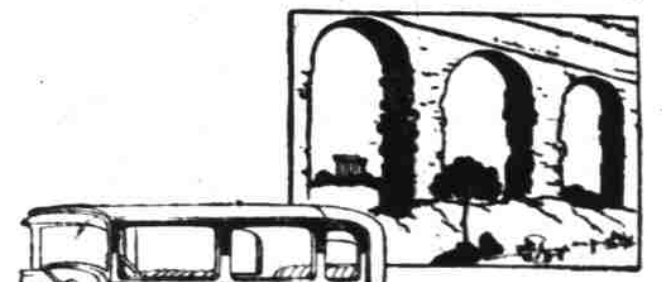
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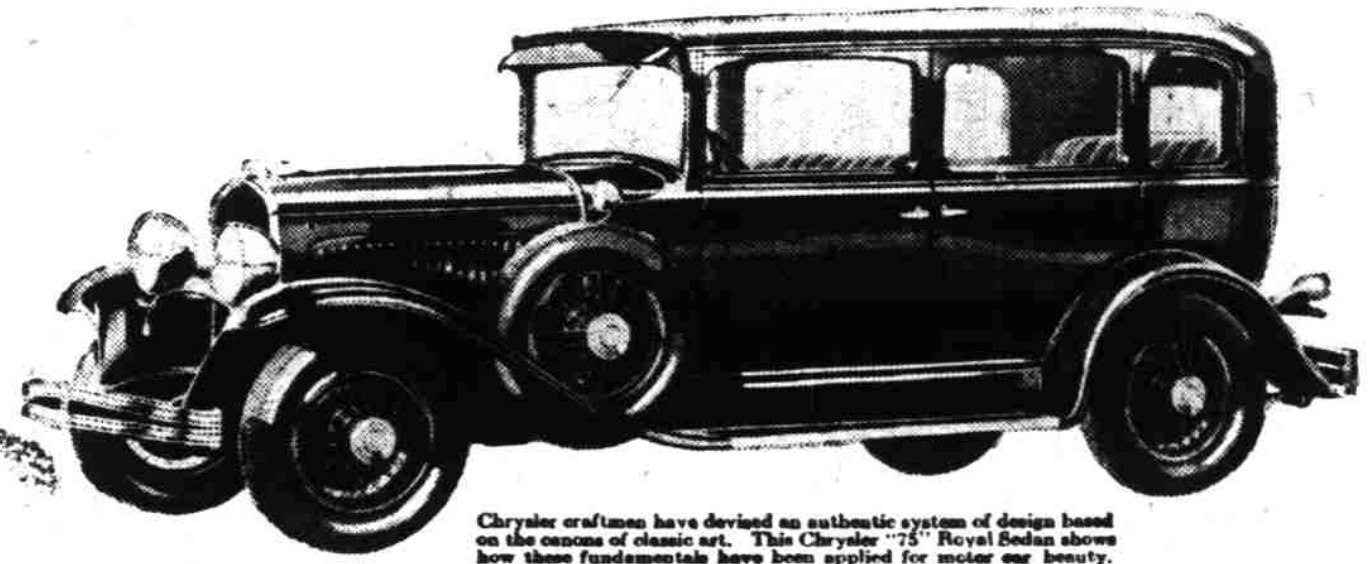
How Chrysler Applies Fundamentals of Classic Art

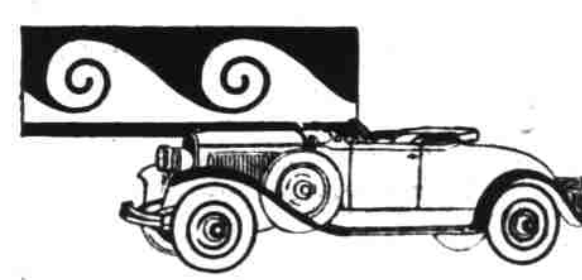
The likeness between Chrysler's "arched" windows and this gracefully arched type of bridge design is striking.



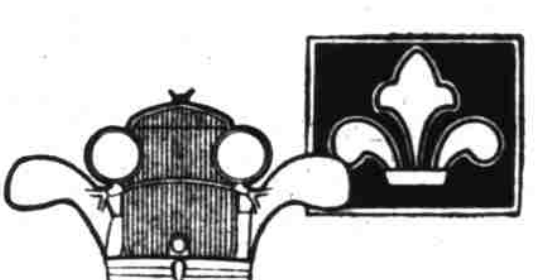
