MINISTERS TO AID IN DRIVE

Entire State Will be Covered in Plan to Enlist All Church Men

The first of a series of group meetings to be held during the next fortnight by Methodist ministers who will assist Willamette university in its drive for \$300,000 additional endowment pledge, was held Monday at Eugene. President Carl G. Doney went to the Lane county city to speak at the meeting which was attended by all Methodist ministers of that section.

Today a similar meeting is to be held in Roseburg, and similar gatherings will be conducted throughout the entire state during the next few weeks.

By February 28, 1929, Willamette university plans to raise \$300,000 to meet \$147,496 available from the General Education board.

Funds raised in 1922 were sufficient to take care of all existing debts and to provide part of the moneys necessary to add \$1,000,000 to the university's endowment. With an additional \$300,000 raised during the next 60 days, Willamette will be able to complete the objective of 1922.

Letters written by Dr. Doney to 5000 friends and alumni of the university were going forward in the mails today as one of the first steps in launching the campaign.

Following the district meetings with pastors of the churches, special solicitors will be put in the field to assist in putting over the drive.

Camilla J. Riggs died Sunday at her home, 492 North Summer street, at the age of 31 years. She had been ill but a short time and death came unexpected.

Camilla J. Perceval was born in Missouri January 3, 1848, the daughter of William and Zureida Perceval. STATE BOARD PUTS BAN ON T. B. HERDS

The state board of control Monday ordered superintendents of the various state institutions here to kill 161 head of dairy cattle which are infected with contagious abortion. A total of 113 reactors will be killed as fast as the meat can be used by the institutions. Approximately 48 cattle suspected of having the disease here to kill 161 head of dairy cattle.

A recent inspection of the state herds showed 161 head of cattle free from the disease. There are 113 reactors and 48 suspects. At some of the institutions it will be necessary to purchase large quantities of milk pending rebuilding of the herds.

The order followed a conference of the board with Dr. W. H. Lytle, state veterinarian, and veterinarians from Oregon state college.
