

TEX RICKARD'S BURIAL IS SET

Remains Will Lie in State Until Wednesday Morning in Fight Arena

The body of Tex Rickard, 34, will be accompanied to the massive steel and stone symbol of Rickard's genius by Jack Dempsey, Walter Fields, Mrs. Rickard and the director of Madison Square Garden.

Once there the body will lie in state until Wednesday morning at 10 a. m., when the public will be admitted. Religious services of a type as yet undetermined will be held at 1:30 p. m., with burial at 2 p. m. in the Rickard plot at Woodlawn, where his first wife and daughter lie.

Discussion Centers Around Successor
While the funeral train sped northward from Florida, discussions as to Rickard's successor, tempered on all sides with expressions of sorrow, were lost in preparations for the return of the "chief." Most prominent were the names of Jack Dempsey, who was Rickard's firm friend and with whom he died; Tom McCardle, present matchmaker at the Garden, and Colonel John S. Hammond. While appointed only temporarily, the latter said he would "hold the job until removed."

One of Hammond's first duties was to issue an announcement that there would be no change in plans for staging the heavyweight match between Jack Sharkey and Young Stribling that sent Rickard to Florida. Hammond said that Rickard would have wanted the fight to go on and that preparations were practically complete to hold the bout February 27.

Miss Lord spoke at length concerning the Arnold arboretum, established in 1868 by Mr. Arnold, 250 acres in extent and given over to the scientific development of all manner of plants and shrubs. When these shrubs become acclimated they are sent out to the nurseries of the country so that some day even we of the west may have the east may be growing shrubs of all varieties which have been made possible through the proper acclimating done in this arboretum.

Miss Edith Schryver, who has come to Salem with Miss Lord, also spoke, emphasizing the value of landscape architecture. She pointed out the benefit of close cooperation between architect, landscape architect and interior decorator in the planning of a satisfactory home.

"Choose your home," said Miss Schryver, "according to the landscape. The water supply, variations in land-levels, surroundings, soil drainage and natural water supply." For city owners Miss Schryver pointed out the value of having kitchens in the front of the house and the living room at the rear so that the family might have the enjoyment and privacy of the garden and not just a lawn with flower beds in the center.

The water will have to be treated with chlorine, Mr. Helwick stated personally in supplementing the statements made in the letter. Chlorination is the only method of making sure that any water supply is safe.

Investigation of the water supply situation here has already been made by the company's chief engineer from New York, the division engineer from San Francisco, and local engineers; and the company's chemists have also made frequent studies of the water now supplied and proposed sources. Although the taste and smell have been bad, the water has been safe, at all times, these tests showed.

In response to questions from members of the council, Mr. Helwick said the pipe line through the rough had been tested last summer and that when the bad taste and smell appeared, there was no possibility of slough water being the source, as the water in the pipe line was under pressure. Hydrants in the city are flushed every day except Sunday and Monday, he added.

Mrs. Elizabeth Ann Shafer, 54, prominent Salem club and lodge woman, died in a Portland hospital Sunday. Mrs. Shafer had been in ill health for several years, her condition becoming alarming only two weeks ago, after she had been at the hospital for an equal length of time.

Mrs. Shafer was born in New Zealand. She organized and was the first worthy high priestess of the White Shrine of Jerusalem. She also was past matron of Chadwick chapter, Order of Eastern Star, and a member of Nydia Temple, Daughters of the Nile, and of the Women's Benefit association. She belonged to several local social clubs.

Mrs. Shafer is survived by her widower, Frank E. Shafer, and three sons, Cecil Shafer, officer in the United States navy; William Earl Shafer, Salem attorney, and Frank Shafer, Jr., freshman at the University of Oregon. Mr. Shafer is a prominent leather dealer. She is also survived by one brother, William T. Hogg of Scotts Mills, and two nieces, Lorraine and Doris Hogg of Scotts Mills.

Funeral services will be held Wednesday morning at 10:30 o'clock from St. Paul's Episcopal church, the Rev. H. Duncan Chubb officiating. Willamette Shrine, Order of the White Shrine of Jerusalem, will conduct ritualistic work. Remains will be taken to the Portland crematorium for final disposition.

In one of his numerous holdups during the past few weeks the ghost bandit frightened a chauffeur so badly that he almost lost his reason and had to be taken to a hospital.

The report would state that this country does not consider that the treaty infringes upon the right of America to defend herself or territories or embassies in any way her rights under the Monroe doctrine; nor that it involves this government in any obligation to enforce the treaty. All of these views have been expressed by Borah in senate debate. The report would merely constitute a record of these pronouncements.

Should the agreement be finally entered into by Senator Borah and other treaty opponents an immediate vote on the treaty is believed possible. The debate has reached a stage where only Senator Reed of the opposition remains on the list of those desiring to speak. It is possible he may not speak at all if the understanding is consummated.

Beautiful Woman Found Murdered In Room of Man
SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Jan. 7.—(AP)—Under circumstances which police say indicate murder, the body of an attractive young woman, believed to be Mrs. Lorraine Ambrose, was discovered today in an apartment.

Mrs. Margaret Peterson told police tonight that she believed the dead woman was her sister, Mrs. Lorraine Ambrose, said to have been infatuated with Garland Williams, in whose apartment the body was found. A search warrant was instituted tonight for Williams, who is believed to be at sea.

The mayor in a brief annual message thanked the members of the council for their cooperation during the past year and urged a continuation of the policies under which he has directed the administration.

He suggested that the building code be amended so that the mayor should be called upon to appoint the inspector, with the council's approval, so that responsibility should be centered. He also suggested that since the bridge program is to be completed at a considerable saving, additional bridges be planned to extend the program insofar as the funds available from the bond issue and additional amounts from the two mill levy will permit.

The city should proceed with a comprehensive sewer program, and make plans looking toward installation of a sewage disposal plant, he added; and the mayor should be given authority to appoint a committee to look after the city's interests in the matter of water supply. He also suggested a more businesslike arrangement for purchasing city supplies.
