Walter Young Heads Fire Department; Other Officers Are Elected

DALLAS, Ore., Jan. 9.—(Special)—The city council met Monday night for the first regular meeting of the New Year. All councilmen were present and a large number of spectators.

Treasurer, W. H. Vassat who has served the city in that capacity for many years, was re-elected treasurer. Oscar Hayer who also has served the city for a number of years was re-elected as city attorney.

W. J. (Dubs) Mulkey was chosen by the council from a list of 16 applicants to serve as chief of police.

R. D. Osburn was re-elected as street commissioner, sanitary inspector and day policeman.

At the regular election in November Leif S. Finseth was elected as mayor, Oscar Hayer as city recorder and police judge. Two new councilmen were also elected at that time, William Ritter and Dr. Peterson. The rest of the councilmen were re-elected except a few who were held over.

The council appointed as new fire chief Walter Young, to replace Roy Kelly who wished to retire.

Owing to the necessity of immediate action on many matters no working policy for the year's work was given out.

THREE SENTENCED IN DALLAS COURT
