WOODBURN, Ore., Jan. 12.—(Special)—While stopping to pick up a student passenger on the Woodburn Silverton highway Friday morning, the car driven by Alvin Rogen of Monitor skidded on the icy pavement and turned over in the ditch. The accident occurred on the sharp corner near the Norton farm about three miles east of Woodburn.

FEEDING OF DAIRY CATTLE DISCUSSED

LINCOLN, Ore., Jan. 12.—(Special)—N. C. Jamieson, livestock extension expert of Oregon State college, gave an interesting and worth while talk on dairying and balanced rations for dairy cattle Monday evening at Lincoln.

In a balanced dairy ration for body maintenance, the use of minerals such as calcium and phosphorus was emphasized. Mr. Jamieson's excellent chart gave the feed requirements for the 1,000 pound cow producing two pounds of milk. He emphasized that no minerals containing drugs should be used, and also said that at times it might be advisable to feed iodine. Kale appears to make the mineral in feed more available to the cow.

County Agent Beck was present and spoke on contagious abortion for which, he said, there is no known cure. Mr. Beck gave some practical advice for those whose herds have become infected with contagious abortion.

Plot Against Manchurian Governor Nipped in Bud

TOKYO, Jan. 11.—(AP)—Discovery of a plot to overthrow Chang Hsuehliang, present governor of Manchuria, was given in Mukden dispatches today as the cause of the execution of Yang Yu-Ting, who was formerly chief of staff to Chang Tso-Lin, father of the present governor and late dictator at Peking.

The reports also stated that Yang Yu-Ting had misappropriated \$20,000,000 Mexican from the arsenal funds at Mukden, that he had opposed the hoisting of the Chinese Nationalist flag in Manchuria and that he had placed Chang Hsueh-Liang in an awkward plight regarding negotiations with Japan in connection with administration of the South Manchurian railway.

The reports added that the Chinese Nationalist government at Nanking first scented the plot and requested Chang to deal with it appropriately.

Anna Case Will Give Concert at Monmouth Soon

MONMOUTH, Ore., Jan. 12.—(Special)—Miss Anna Case, world famous soprano, formerly with the Metropolitan Opera company, will appear in concert at the auditorium of Oregon Normal school, January 18 at 8 o'clock.

Miss Case, who ranks with Schumann-Heink, Caruso and Nordica, in musical fame, is noted especially for her realistic interpretations of vocal music. Her career is one of the most phenomenal and interesting of the great singers, as she rose from obscure and restricted surroundings, handicapped by poverty and an unsympathetic father, to a position with the Metropolitan Opera company exactly one year and a half after taking her first music lesson.
