

OREGON NEAR TOP IN NUMBER OF BOARDS AND COMMISSIONS

Sixty-Seven Functioning in State, Reports to Executive Reveal

Oregon has the distinction of being near the top of the list of states within relation to the number of boards and commissions maintained.

Reports received at the executive department during the past few weeks show that there are 67 boards and commissions functioning in the state at present. These do not include a large number of state departments and institutions.

Among the most important of the state commissions and boards are the state highway commission, insurance commission, state tax commission, public service commission, state industrial accident commission, state banking board, state game commission, state fish commission, state labor commission, reclamation commission and industrial welfare commission.

Virtually all of these boards and commissions have regulatory powers and are vested with authority to employ inspectors and investigators. As a result of this power, there are numerous sets of inspectors traveling about the state looking after the "welfare" of the public.

Consolidation Talked

The suggestion was made recently that a large amount of money might be saved to the taxpayers by eliminating duplication of inspectors. It was pointed out that the field wardens employed by the state fish commission might be used in lieu of field wardens employed by the state game commission. It also was argued that the field operatives of the state dairy and food commission might absorb the duties of inspectors now employed by the sealers of weights and measures. Other similar eliminations might be made without decreasing the efficiency of the state government.

An attempt was made at previous legislative sessions to consolidate a number of boards and commissions, but nothing was accomplished. Legislators were told that such a program would weaken the governmental structure without any material saving to the taxpayers.

It was said, however, that the real opposition to the consolidations developed among the heads of the various boards and commissions affected. The objection was raised that the proposed consolidations would rob the various departments of prestige, and result in eliminating a large number of faithful employees from the state payroll.

List Is Lengthy

The complete list of boards and commissions, as reported to Governor Patterson follow:

Public service commission, regulation of public utility corporations.

Industrial Accident commission—Administration of workmen's compensation act.

State banking board—Regulation of state banks.

Labor commission—Enforcement of labor laws.

Industrial welfare commission—Regulate hours of employment for women and minors.

Child welfare commission—General supervision over child welfare work.

Child labor board—Inspection of factories, workshops and mercantile institutions.

State conciliation board—Arbitration of labor disputes.

Prohibition commissioner—Enforcement of state prohibition law.

Mining board—Conduct studies of mining.

Parole board—Investigation of paroles for prisoners in state penitentiary.

Board of forestry—Patrol and protect state forests.

Highway commission—Construct and maintain state highways.

Insurance commission—Protect public against insurance fraud and regulate activities of insurance concerns.

State fire marshal—Protect public against fire hazards, and recommend improvements in fire conditions.

Real estate commission—License real estate brokers and agents.

State fish commission—Regulate commercial fishing.

State game commission—Propagate game fish and game animals.

Director of hatcheries—Propagate salmon and supervise state hatcheries.

Americanization department—Americanize foreign born citizens.

Ship securities commission—Pass on ship securities for trust funds.

Board of aeronautics—Regulate aircraft and aviators.

Bond commission—Invest funds of segregated accident fund, industrial accident fund and catastrophe fund.

Textbook commission—Select textbooks for public schools.

State Aid commission—Administer laws relating to relief of ex-service men.

Geographic board—Supervise naming of geographic features.

Hydro-electric commission—Collect data concerning hydro-electric resources.

State land board—Control disposition of state lands.

Land settlement commission—Encourage settlement of lands and build up of rural districts.

Reclamation commission—Administer laws relating to irrigation.

Advisory board of boxing commission—Passes on questions involving duties of boxing commissions.

Board of higher curriculum—Determine what courses of study shall be taught in higher educational institutions.

Legislative service and reference board—Draft bills for legislators, and make reports to them.

Judicial council—Investigate and study rules of practice in the courts.

Pilot commission—Examine and license pilots.

Sailors' Boarding house commission—

chiropractic. Board—Examine and license applicants to practice chiropractic.

Board of medical examiners—Examine and license applicants to practice medicine.

Board of dental examiners—Examine and license applicants to practice dentistry.

State board of health—Supervise all matters relating to health.

Board of graduate nurses—Examine and license graduate nurses.

Bureau of public health nursing—Service in advisory capacity to public health nurses.

Bureau of child hygiene—Instruct mothers in maternal and child hygiene.

Board of Eugenics—Investigate innate traits, and mental and physical condition of feeble minded persons.

Veterinary medical examiners—Examine and license applicants to practice veterinary profession.

Board of cosmetic therapy—Examine and license applicants to practice therapy.

Embalmers examining board—Examine and license applicants to engage in embalming.

Board of barber examiners—Examine and license applicants to practice barbering.

Board of architects—Examine and license applicants to engage in the architect profession.

Board of accountancy—Examine and license accountants.

Board of engineers—Examine and license engineers.

Vocational education board—Promote vocational education.

State market agents—Promote interests of rural districts and

conduct state grain departments.

Weights and measures department—Inspect and adjust scales and weights.

Dairy and food commission—Enforce laws relation to food products.

Brand adjusting board—Adjust conflicting livestock brands.

Board of horticulture—Exercise supervision over horticulture industry.

Lime board—Provide farmers with state lime.

Livestock sanitary board—Exercise sanitary supervision over livestock.

Pure seed board—Prescribe standards for purity of seeds.

Stallion registration board—License stallions and jacks and regulate their use.

State tax commission—Compile and enforce collection of taxes.

Convicted Murderers Get 15 Days More to Live as Supreme Court Relents

New ORLEANS, Jan. 12.—(AP)—The Louisiana supreme court today granted Mrs. Ada Bonner Lehouef and Dr. Thomas E. Dreher 15 more days to live.

They were under sentence to die on the gallows at Franklin tomorrow for the murder of James J. Lehouef, the woman's husband, 18 months ago. The state contended at a trial that a love affair between the woman and the physician was the motive.

In a decision late today the court denied a plea for appoint-

ment of a lunacy commission to determine the present sanity of the condemned pair and also ruled that Chief Justice Charles A. O'Neill had no right to grant a stay of execution last Friday night over the protest of four associate justices.

Defense attorneys were granted 15 days, however, in which to file an appeal for a rehearing on the decision.

Informed of the latest development in the case Mrs. Lehouef and Dr. Dreher were jubilant in

their cells in the Franklin jail. Mrs. Lehouef's children, with her and Mrs. Dreher and children were with the doctor. They were making what they thought would be their last before the executions. Sheriff Pecot had informed them they could not see Mrs. Lehouef and Dr. Dreher again.

Chief Justice O'Neill disapproved from the opinion of the five associate justices today in holding from without authority to the stay last Friday.
