

SENATE TAKES UP WAR BILLS

Hot Fight Looms Up Over Authorization of Sixteen New Warships

WASHINGTON, Jan. 16.—(AP)—The senate turned today to the other side of the treaty-cruiser controversy when advocates of the bill for the construction of 16 new warships took the offensive in an attempt to win for their measure approval similar to that given the Kellogg treaty to renounce war.

Waiting, however, for the opportunity to make a determined fight against the construction of the proposed 16 cruisers and one aircraft carrier was a formidable group of senators who hope to defeat the bill, or at least materially reduce the number of cruisers to be authorized.

Equally determined to keep the measure intact was Chairman Hale of the senate naval affairs committee, who was given support in the opening debate today by a democrat Senator Swanson, of Virginia, who aided the administration in its fight for ratification of the Kellogg pact.

Coolidge Backs Bill
Construction of the new ships has the active support of President Coolidge who repeatedly has given expression to a desire for the authorization of additional war craft. The president, however, has asked elimination of a clause providing that the ships shall be laid down within five years. This provision is known as "the time clause," the retention of which is insisted upon by Chairman Hale and some other advocates of the bill.

The principal opposition to the construction of the ships is expected from a group of western senators including Norris, of Nebraska, Brookhart, of Iowa, Nye, and Frazier, of North Dakota, republicans, and King, of Utah, a democrat.

Filibuster Possible
The group so far has given no notice of an intention to filibuster against the measure but it is probably that they will be sufficiently strong to postpone a final vote for some time.

The bill has been passed by the house and will go directly to President Coolidge if no senate charges are made. Should the bill be altered, however, a conference would be necessary, and there then would be a danger of the conference report being caught in a last minute legislative jam in the senate.

Taking up the cause of the administration, Senator Swanson asked approval of the bill, he argued its approval would tend to accelerate further discussion of naval armament limitation, thereby preventing a warship building race between the United States and Great Britain.

Coolidge To Sign Peace Treaty At 10 a. m. Today

WASHINGTON, Jan. 16.—(AP)—A White House ceremony was arranged today by President Coolidge for his formal signing at 10 o'clock tomorrow morning of the document of ratification of the Kellogg Treaty pledging the nations of the world to renounce war.

Members of the senate who yesterday ratified the treaty by a vote of 85 to 1 were invited to attend by Mr. Coolidge who also will have with him the members of the cabinet. The ceremony will be held in the east room of the White House.

Vice President Dawes announced to the senate this afternoon that the president had requested him to extend the senators an invitation to be present at the signing of the document.

Effect Considered
In the wake of the drawn out fight in the senate over an interpretative declaration on the treaty there arose some speculation today as to whether the interpretative report on the treaty finally submitted by the foreign relations committee had not spread on the record a new and stricter construction upon the Monroe Doctrine.

Chairman Borah of the committee who drafted the report, which was not voted upon, took the position that the report limited America's right to interfere in South American affairs only in question of self defense. It was further contended by some that this is a stricter construction than was adhered to by the Coolidge administration in its Nicaragua policy.

Monroe Doctrine Backed
The committee report stated that "the United States regards the Monroe Doctrine as a part of

WASHINGTON, Jan. 16.—(AP)—The Conference for the Cause and Cure of War late today re-elected Mrs. Carrie Chapman Catt of New York as its national chairman. At Mrs. Catt's request three vice chairmen were named to assist her, because of her recent ill health. The three new vice chairmen are Miss Ruth Morgan, Mrs. D. E. Wald, and Miss Henrietta Roelofs, all of New York.

Two secretaries also were named instead of one as heretofore. Miss Josephine Schain of New York was re-elected corresponding secretary and Mrs. Ben Hooper of Wisconsin, was chosen recording secretary. Mrs. Edgerton Parsons of New York was elected treasurer.

The unity of feeling between American and European women in the cause of world peace was stressed at today's sessions. Telegrams of congratulation from Lady Astor, member of the British parliament, and Miss Kate Courtney, head of the British women's crusade for arbitration, were read and greetings from the international alliance of women for suffrage and equal citizenship were brought in person by the organization's vice-president, Miss Rosa Manus, of Holland.

ANNIVERSARY OF DRY LAW HONORED

WASHINGTON, Jan. 16.—(AP)—Calling the attention of the senate today to the tenth anniversary of national prohibition, Senator Sheppard, of Texas, author of the eighteenth amendment, described the dry movement as "forever anchored in the heart and purpose of Almighty God."

National prohibition is an expression, the senate declared, of the "moral sentiment of the American people, a sentiment inseparable from the progressive civilization of America."

The Texan was asked by Senator Bruce, of Maryland, a wet, whether he was aware that "a large number of states" had repealed their dry enforcement laws and Sheppard replied that he had "covered that phase" in his statement that doubtless prohibition would be subjected to numerous reverses before it became totally effective.

Senator Sheppard eulogized the work of the W. C. T. U. and the anti-saloon league in keeping a close vigilance over the prohibition laws.
