## ELDEST WOMAN IN CITY DIES

Monmouth Pioneer Arrived in Oregon Over Barlow Road in 1848

MONMOUTH, Jan. 16. (Special)—Funeral services for Mrs. Elizabeth Stewart, 89, Monmouth's oldest woman resident, who died at her home here January 11, were held at 1:30 o'clock Sunday afternoon at the Walter L. Smith funeral home, the Rev. L. H. Willard of the Monmouth Evangelical church officiating.

As one of the few remaining pioneers of the section, "Grandma" Stewart was widely known, and friends and neighbors were planning a celebration of her 90th birthday anniversary this month. Her illness was due to a cold and bronchitis, and until ten days prior to her death she had enjoyed excellent health.

Elizabeth Davis, the youngest daughter of Mr. and Mrs. James Davis, was born January 26, 1839, in Page county, Ill., near Elgin. The family emigrated to Oregon by wagon train in 1848, entering the Willamette valley by the old Barlow road. They settled between Monmouth and Independence on a homestead whose original boundaries have been obliterated by the changes of time.

Married in 1855 Elizabeth Davis was married to James R. Carmack in 1855, and they located on a half section of land, a direct donation from the government, about two miles northwest of Independence. Mr. Carmack died in 1904. Mrs. Carmack continued to live on the home farm for 65 years. In 1868 she was married to W. M. Stewart. Her brother-in-law, T. L. Burbank, was one of the founders of Independence and helped to name the town.

Mrs. Stewart remembered outstanding historical incidents of this section, such as the building of the first house in Independence, arrival of the first steam boat and first steam train at Independence. She was noted for others and for her remarkable ability to adapt herself to the vicissitudes of the present. Although injured in two automobile wrecks in recent years, she was always ready to take another venture with no apparent fear of accident. Mr. Stewart died in 1907.

Surviving are one son, Samuel E. Carmack, Monmouth; four grandchildren; six great-grandchildren; four nieces and two nephews. She had made her home in Monmouth with the Carmack

## PERMIT TO BUILD SIDEWALK GRANTED

WOODBURN, Jan. 16.—(Special)—The much discussed sidewalk on Wilson street was finally acted upon at a meeting of the city council Tuesday evening. The council decided that W. J. Wilson will be permitted to build the walk providing the west end be built on a level with the street grade at that point.

The ordinances on the speed limit of trains going through the city was changed so that the limit will be not lower than 25 miles an hour. The ordinance will be in effect both day and night.

A building permit was granted to R. Gilbert for an addition to the Economy Cleaners on Garfield street. Specifications call for a modern fireproof addition. The council voted to buy a sewer cleaner and root cutter.

A resolution declaring the city's intention to improve North Sixth street from Harrison to Fir was passed by the council. An ordinance providing for the assessment of the cost of improvement of North Second street was also passed.

Street commissioner John Muir asked that notices be provided for posting at the city dump forbidding people to dump garbage promiscuously. Hereafter the gate will be kept locked and dumping will be done only on permission of the street commissioner.
