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VARIOUS BILLS PUT IN HOPPER

Five Measures Introduced in Senate and Even Dozen in House

The following bills were introduced in the senate Monday:

S. B. 20, by Norblad—Authorizing the state of Oregon to lease the Oregon national guard training camp in Clatsop county.

S. B. 21, by Norblad—Providing for an election to submit the question to the legal voters of the establishment of a park board and transferring their power to the city government.

S. B. 22, by Moser—Amending statutes defining fraternal benefit societies and providing for their regulation and control.

S. B. 23, by Norblad—Relating to actions by and against executors or administrators.

S. B. 24, by Kuck—Relating to meeting places for military organizations.

Twelve bills were thrown into the hopper in the Oregon house of representatives Monday, as follows:

H. B. 152, by Potter—Relating to the power of county courts in establishing election precincts.

H. B. 153, by Norblad—Creating a separate fish and game district and commission in Tillamook county.

H. B. 154, by Egbert—Relating to county road levies.

H. B. 155, by Window—Creating a separate fish and game district and commission in Tillamook county.

H. B. 156, by Bynon—Providing for an appropriation for Mrs. Gertrude J. Denay, not to exceed \$100 a month, and payable out of funds of the State Game Commission.

H. B. 157, by Scott—Amending section 2085, Oregon Laws, to define the age of consent of a female to be 17 years.

H. B. 158, by James H. E. Scott, of Umatilla—Amending section 10053, Oregon Laws, defining a widow's dower rights.

H. B. 159, by James H. E. Scott, of Umatilla—Extending the rights of dower to husband.

H. B. 160, by James H. E. Scott, of Umatilla—Regulating the dower of a husband, relating to real estate.

H. B. 161, by James H. E. Scott, of Umatilla—Relating to foreclosure of tax liens, and providing for publication.

H. B. 162, by Metzger—Increasing juror's fee in courts of record.

H. B. 163, by Metzger—Providing for appeals from municipal court judgments.

ELLIOT HITS HARD AT RESORT CROWD

"I'd rather take a contract to win a hundred slugs in Chicago or New York than to try to win one Miami or Palm Beach," declared A. J. Elliot in a sermon at the First Methodist church Sunday morning.

The mere amassing of dollars does not satisfy the deeper cravings of life," he said. The result of the modern youth he ascribed in part as an attempt to satisfy certain yearnings of the heart for a spiritual reality.

In his closing meeting with Willamette university students on Sunday afternoon, Mr. Elliot emphasized the challenge of the Christian life and compared its salient aspects to those of the game of football. "When you get into a good football game, they'll tackle you hard; and as you get nearer to Christ you'll find them tackling you hard, too," he declared. Helps toward success in football are to play as the coach directs, to study the rules, to talk to the older players and to play the game, he stated, and added that the same could be said of trying to live a successful Christian life.

Before coming to Willamette university, Mr. Elliot held meetings on the Linfield campus at McMinnville. His Oregon itinerary includes Albany college, the University of Oregon and Oregon State college.

HONOR ROLL EVENT PLANNED FOR FAIR

The Honor Roll parade which Marion board school children have held in Salem near the close of the school year for the past two years, will this year be held as one of the attractions for the first day of the Oregon state fair, Mrs. Mary L. Fulkerson, county school superintendent, announced Monday.

Under this plan, no health parade will be held Sunday, the children who are entitled to march as recognition of their year's health program to participate in the parade before the fair crowds.

Under the new plan, the parade will be held Monday, September 22, the opening day of the fair and children's day. This will involve no expense for the children of the city and county, as school children are always admitted free to the fair on children's day.

If it should rain the opening day, the parade will be held in the stadium on the grounds, and if not it will be held in the open as has been customary.

Whether the Salem school children will join with the county schools for the parade at fair-time is still undecided, as the matter was only presented to City Superintendent George W. Hug Monday, and he will pass it along to his school principals before taking final action. Mr. Hug was favorable to the plan, however, and will little likelihood of being not join forces with the county schools in the honor roll parade.

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TEACHERS BILL COMES TO VOTE

Special Order of Business Provided for; Other Measures Proposed

The teachers retirement fund association on bill, affecting Multnomah county teachers more than 44 years old, will be brought to vote in the senate at 11 a. m. Thursday under a special order. The bill, which was introduced by the joint Multnomah county delegation, provides for a readjustment of fees and benefits in connection with administrative of the teachers' retirement fund.

The state of Oregon would take over the lease to the Oregon national guard training camp in Clatsop county under a bill introduced by President Norblad. The tract contains approximately 361 acres, with an annual rental of \$2353.

It was set out in the bill that Clatsop county already has contributed nearly \$15,000 in building a road into the camp and has paid approximately \$5000 in rentals. The state is requested to take over the lease, which expires February 28, 1937.

A resolution will be introduced by Senator Norblad later in the session urging the federal government to assume ownership of the training camp. It was said that the government already has expended more than \$100,000 in the erection of new buildings and other improvements.

The senate sustained the veto of Governor Patterson of a bill introduced at the 1927 legislative session increasing the salaries of certain officials of Wasco county.

The bill was vetoed by Governor Patterson in compliance with his promise to the voters that he would not sanction any salary increases during the 1927 session.

A resolution by Senator Norblad and Representative Hamilton of Astoria to give a Lincoln day address at a joint session of the senate and house of representatives on Tuesday, February 12, was adopted by the Rev. Mr. Ferguson is grand orator of the Masonic grand lodge of Oregon.

Appointment of a committee composed of H. B. Vanduzer, chairman of the state highway commission, and John W. Kelly and Robert C. Johnson, Portland newspapermen, for the purpose of selecting a site for a memorial for the late John B. Yeon, was proposed in a resolution introduced by Senator Dunne. The resolution carries an appropriation of \$2500.
