Legislation relating to registry of veterans of the Indian wars of 1847 and 1857, and to reimbursement for horses killed about this time in Indian wars, was also brought to the attention of the house by house bill 61, which will come up for final action tomorrow. Further study on the bill was asked Thursday.

H. B. 27, repealing sections 2928 to 2934, relating to location of Eastern Oregon state hospital.
H. B. 39, repealing sections 4148 to 4249 relating to taxation.
H. B. 41, repealing sections 4851 to 4852 relating to Hedges.
H. B. 47, repealing sections 5317 to 5328 relating to military training in high schools.
H. B. 49, repealing sections 5811 to 5814, relating to survey of Columbia river.
H. B. 50, repealing sections 5974 and 5975, relating to repair of railroads by receivers.
H. B. 53, repealing section 6498 to 6552, relating to marine insurance.
H. B. 54, repealing sections 7060, relating to eminent domain.
H. B. 56, repealing sections 7056 to 7094, relating to mill races and mills.
H. B. 59, repealing sections 8299 to 8293, relating to Indians.

"The first step was realization that light and heat are related. That came early in history of mankind. The others all are recent. As the second step, Jules and Einstein showed that heat and energy (energy being another word for work) are related definitely by physical laws that idea was almost wholly incredible for a time, though now all our engines are based upon that law. One by one were shown the interrelations of light, heat, energy, matter, space, time, gravitation and electricity until the only factor missing was the specific relation between electricity and gravitation, this is what Einstein has given us."

CHILD WELFARE IS COMMITTEE TOPIC

a clearing house for the state aided charitable institutions and determines whether the children admitted to the homes are entitled to state aid. It is also the function of the committee to force the transfer of the wards into free homes as far as conditions will permit.
It was explained by Dr. Parsons that the additional appropriation of \$6987 was needed to employ two additional field workers in order to comply with the suggestions of the state board of control with relation to more thorough investigations.
A report of the committee which recently inspected the Oregon state hospital was to the effect that the institution was in splendid condition. The committee recommended an appropriation of \$966,578 which was approved by Governor Patterson. This amount includes \$60,647 for the construction of an industrial building and other capital outlays. The state hospital received an appropriation of \$1,059,336 for the two years ending December 31, 1928.
A similar report was received in connection with the inspection of the state tuberculosis hospital. It was set out in a report that the cottage was badly needed for the use of the assistant superintendent, but in view of the unsatisfactory condition of the state's finances, it was found impossible to recommend such an improvement. The budget for the state tuberculosis hospital, as approved by the governor, is \$225,778. The appropriation for the past biennium was \$220,822.
The committee which inspected the eastern Oregon state tuberculosis hospital at The Dalles commended the state board of control in connection with the selection of the site. This plant is now in progress of construction and probably will be ready for occupancy about May 1. An appropriation of \$102,500 was approved by Governor Patterson for this institution. The report of the committee was ordered filed, but no action was taken on the proposed appropriation pending further investigations.
A report of the committee which inspected the eastern Oregon state normal school at La Grande stressed the generosity of La Grande citizens who donated the site valued at more than \$29,000, and contributed additional funds for roads and other improvements. An appropriation of \$79,500 was recommended by Governor Patterson for this institution. Definite action on the appropriation will be taken at a subsequent meeting of the ways and means committee.
The eastern Oregon state hospital at Pendleton was reported by an investigating committee to be in splendid condition, with a per capita cost of operation slightly in excess of \$17 per month.

rate of four per cent. The new law gives the school board authority to retire a teacher at any time when she has outlived her usefulness as an instructor. The teachers retirement fund bill applies only to the Portland school district.
The senate adopted a resolution introduced by Senators E. F. Bailey and others directing the president of the University of Oregon and Oregon State college to prepare and deliver to the chief clerk a list of all resident students together with certain other information. The purpose of the resolution is to determine the number of non-resident students who are paying tuition in the higher educational institutions of this state.
An increased tariff on filberts imported into the United States from southern European countries was urged in a memorial introduced by Senator George Gove of Marion county. The memorial was referred to the committee on industries.
A resolution introduced by Senator Hall authorizes the appointment of a committee of five members of the Oregon legislature to confer with similar committees from the states of California and Washington with relation to uniform traffic regulations. Two members of the committee would be appointed by the president of the senate and three members by the speaker of the house.
It was proposed in the resolution to hold the conference in Salem. Any laws or regulations recommended at the conference will be submitted for consideration during the present legislative session. A similar conference was held during the legislative session two years ago.
The senate approved a bill introduced by Representative Hamilton and Carlin providing for the repeal of an obsolete section of the state's revenue code, official seals. Approval of this bill was recommended by the house repeals committee.
Telegrams received from Senator Butler and Representative Hawley pledging their support of a memorial to Congress for timber and timber products were read during the morning session. Copies of this memorial which was adopted earlier in the session were telegraphed to Oregon's delegation in congress.

Facts and Gossip . . . Brief Bits of News and Belief Gathered Here and There in Legislative Halls.

The most conspicuous thing in the house of representatives Thursday was a jug of sparkling water on the desk of Speaker R. S. Hamilton. It was marked "Tumalo water, from Bend." The supply of mountain water was sent by Mayor George Gove of Bend to his fellow townsman, and was a special significance in Salem since Bend a few years ago suffered the same encroachment of algae in its water which is worrying Salem at present.
Another visitor at the legislature from Bend Thursday was "Bill" Vandeventer, pioneer stockman, who has witnessed legislative procedure in Oregon since as long ago as the appearance of some ancient laws now being repealed. His home, "The Old Homestead," south of Bend is well known to early residents of Oregon.
Members of Representative Briggs' committee on repeal of laws did not know that any county in Oregon maintained trails, but they, other members of the house and the public at large were informed by Knapp of Curry county that Curry maintains some 75 miles of such aids to transportation. This information was the cause of postponing final action on H. B. 40, which would have repealed legislation on maintenance of trails by counties from Thursday morning to Friday.
