

# HOUSE BURDEN IS TAX BILLS

One of 23 Bills in Hopper  
Creates and Regulates  
Control Board

Finance and taxation legislation dominated in the 23 bills introduced into the house of representatives at the session Friday morning. Outstanding measures that are expected to attract a lot of attention include that creating a board of control and regulating it duties, providing a two percent rebate on all taxes paid in full before April 15 and that removing from tax exemptions all municipally owned property except that used for government, educational, park or charitable purposes.

H. B. 231, by Anderson, Carlin and Hamilton—Limiting the bonded indebtedness of all municipal corporations not otherwise limited by law.

H. B. 232, by Anderson, Carlin and Hamilton—Regulating bond elections.

H. B. 239, by Anderson, Carlin and Hamilton—Amending chapter 130, General laws of Oregon, 1927, relating to the state budget act.

H. B. 240, by Loneragan—Providing for a 2 percent rebate on all taxes paid in full on or before April 15 in any given year.

H. B. 241, by Loneragan—Providing for a delinquent tax roll.

H. B. 242, by Loneragan—Providing that all taxes must be paid before sheriff's deed is granted.

H. B. 243, by Loneragan—Abolishing the fee for filings which relate solely to interest on commerce.

H. B. 244, by Loneragan—Providing that railroads keep pass list open for public service commission inspection.

H. B. 245, by Norton, Knapp and Senator Hall—Providing appropriation for widow of Clyde R. Dindinger.

H. B. 246, by Bronaugh—Providing for an increase in the salary of the industrial accident commission.

H. B. 247, by Russell and Carlin—Providing for the supervision of all municipally owned utilities by public service commission.

H. B. 248, by Bronaugh—Repealing the present real estate code and providing a substitute.

H. B. 249, by LaFollett—Compelling all manufacturers of economic poison used for spray purposes to place on container date of manufacture.

H. B. 250, by Marion county delegation—A Lane county salary bill.

H. B. 251, by Russell—Defining the duties of the state tax commission.

H. B. 252, by Russell—Removing from the tax exemptions all municipally owned property except that used for governmental, educational, park or charitable purposes.

H. B. 253, by Jas. H. E. Scott—Requires recording of conditional bills of sale.

S. B. 48, by Moser—Relating to pilotage on the Willamette and Columbia rivers.

S. B. 49, by Corbett—Authorizing an additional circuit judge in Multnomah county.
