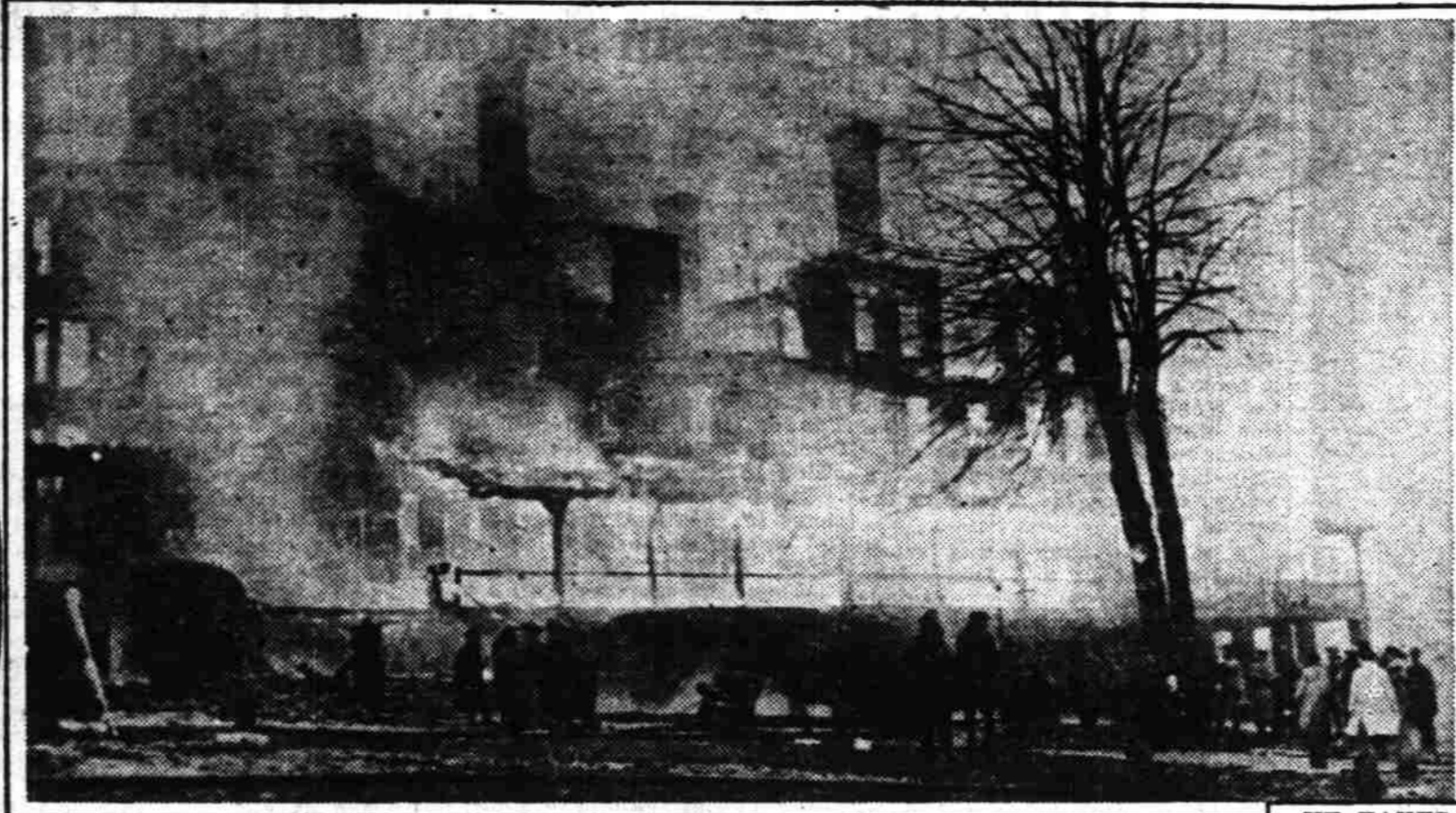

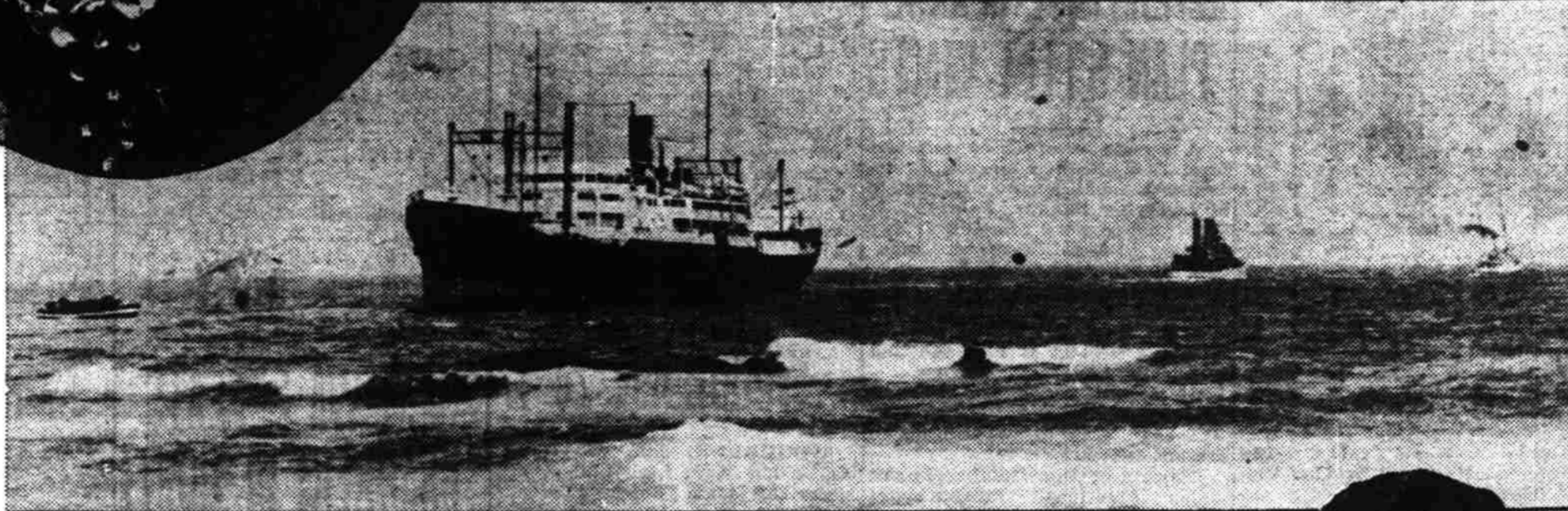
THE DUCHESS of Alba, come to life. Miss Aurelie Murchison of New York obtained this costume for the Beaux Arts ball in the metropolis.

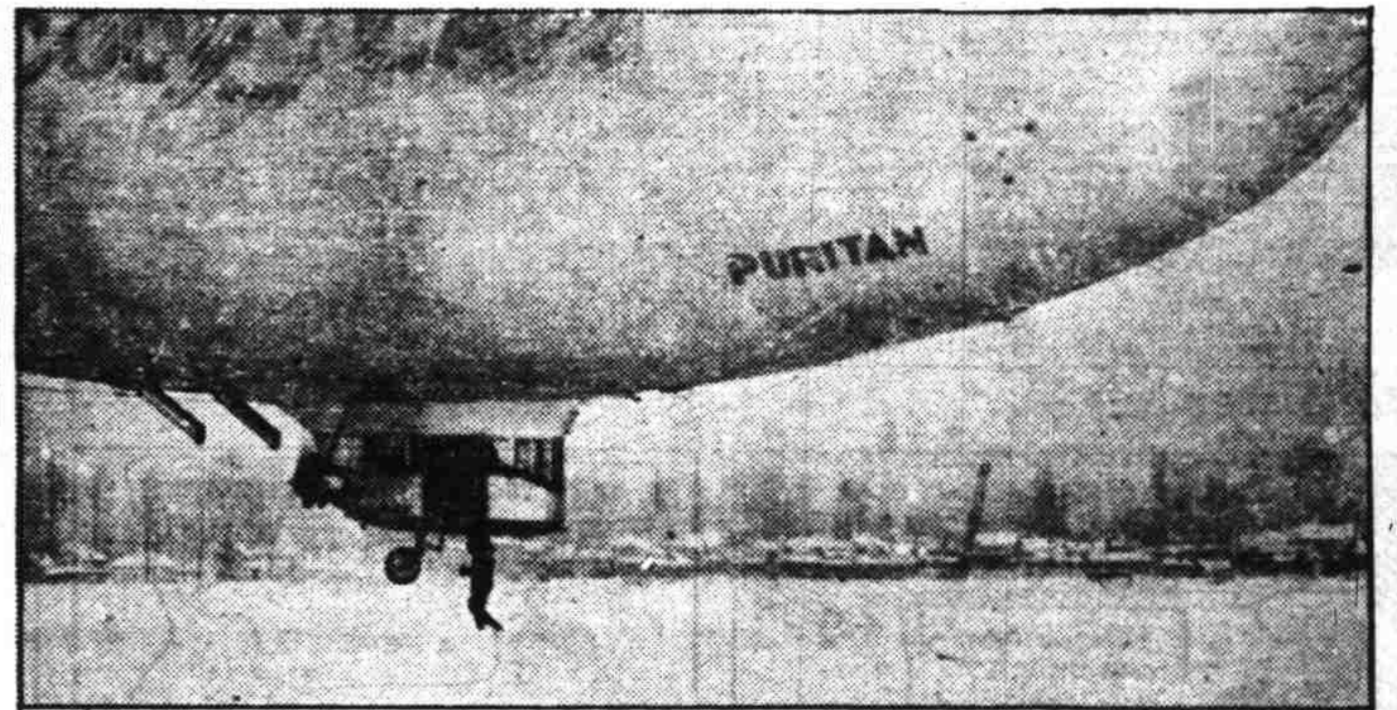
