Snow Forces Plane Down—Captain A. I. Eagle, commandant of Pearson field at Vancouver, Wash., was forced to land his airplane on the Leo N. Childs subdivision a mile east of Salem and near Four Corners late Sunday afternoon when snowfall and weather conditions generally were unfavorable to continuance of his flight from the south to Vancouver. The plane will be left on the field until weather conditions are more favorable.

Y. M. C. A. Class Tonight—Dr. Edward Lee Russell of the Marion county child health demonstration will talk on "Development of Honesty in the Child" at the weekly Tuesday night class conducted at the Y. M. C. A. for the study of child welfare problems. Preliminary restrictions on the size of the class have had to be removed. It has become so popular with parents. The class is open to adults, and is free.

Whitley, who is accused of writing a small check and signing the name J. E. Bartlett to it, waived hearing and was ordered bound over to the grand jury. Williams, who is accused of having forged a check for \$24, asked that an attorney be appointed for him. He is being held in the county jail in default of \$2000 bail.

PASTOR QUIZES CHURCH FLOCK

"Worship" is Reason Half of Congregation Attends
M. E. Church

Answers to a questionnaire filled out two weeks ago in a church service formed the basis for a sermon on "The Layman in Action," by Dr. Fred C. Taylor at the First Methodist church Sunday morning. A total of 405 questionnaires were filled out; 80 were by persons under 20 years of age, 101 were by persons between 20 and 40 years old.

Ten questions covering a wide field of interest to the members of the church were asked. Dr. Taylor declared that the answers were very helpful to him and that he would be guided in a measure by the will which they expressed.

Many of the questions gave a possibility for more than one answer, so that a wider range of sentiment could be expressed by those filling out the cards.

In answer to the question, "What is your main reason for attending church?" 222 parishioners checked the answer, "Worship." A large number gave "the sermon" as their reason, while duty, habit and social life took minor places.

Indifference Granted
"Indifference" was given as the leading reason for irregular attendance and non-attendance of many church members. Auto trips, worldliness and the Sunday movies, together with work, the radio and "babes," one individual gave "The Devil" as the chief reason for poor church attendance.

In answer to the question, "What do you think might be used more in the church?" "evangelistic appeal" was the most popular answer. More congregational singing, children's services and illustrated lectures received substantial votes. One member suggested "more horse sense."

The home was given 284 votes as having the most influence upon life. The church, school and the movies trailed with smaller numbers, and the daily paper was given an last place.

A church service of one hour's length was given plurality over services of an hour and 15 minutes and an hour and a half length. Dr. Taylor pointed out that this vote was largely from the age of people active in Sunday school, and that by the time the church opened, most of them had already had a service of an hour and 15 minutes.

Few radical changes from the present program of church activity were advocated by the voters. Radio broadcasting, forenoon services only, services without offering and summer vacation received scattering votes.
