

# INFIRMARY IS ASKED, EUGENE

### Bill Introduced Here Would Appropriate \$50,000 for University

The "Mothers and Dads" bill, calling for an appropriation of \$50,000 for an infirmary at the University of Oregon, was introduced in the house Tuesday under the names of Representative Lowman of Multnomah and Senator Norblad of Clatsop county. It is understood that the "Oregon Dads" and others have already subscribed the \$50,000 called for to match the state appropriation, so that construction on the building could begin at an early date should the measure pass both houses and be signed by the governor.

So far no organized opposition to the bill is evident in either house, while the attitude of the governor has not been determined. Governor Patterson listened attentively to the delegation of mothers when they called here recently but did not commit himself.

The report of the joint committee which visited the university last week is expected to have considerable influence on the way the measure will be received when it comes up for final action. This report is expected soon. Legislators on the trip thoroughly investigated the present infirmary, which has capacity for but 13 and which is housed in a building declared to be a firetrap and in need of repairs.

## Strange Experience of an Italian Boy is Chronicle For the Late James Elvin

Here is his story as I get it at first hand. On a raw December day in 1906 an Italian immigrant boy climbed down from a box car when a "drag" or freight, rolled into the yards at Terry. He was only 12, penniless, hungry, and numb with cold. Undaunted by the cold, he set out on foot for Miles City, 43 miles away. He had come into the northwest as a traveling hypnotist's assistant. The hypnotist had ditched the boy in western South Dakota. He had "hopped" a freight and that bitter cold day, 22 years ago, found him tramping the trail between Terry and Miles City.

It took him two days to make the trip and he was finally taken in by a rancher who gave him a job tending sheep. Life on the ranch was no bed of roses. Coyotes are the terror of sheepmen. A coyote will crawl into the band of sheep, roll over, and play and frisk with the lambs. The lamb will follow a little way, is then quickly snatched by the throat, flung over the coyote's back and the good-by lamb. When coyotes got into Frank's band of sheep, one night, and killed 12 sheep, the rancher's wife took a rattlesnake whip and lashed the boy viciously. Warm Calabrian blood could not stand that, so the boy ran away, vowing to himself, "Some day I'll come back and buy that ranch."

newspapers and magazines. The young minister made a trip to the United States, on behalf of the Italian veterans. Congress finally gave Gigliotti the privilege, rarely accorded to a non-member, of addressing a joint session from the floor. The bill was passed without a dissenting vote. Surely it was a long way from the day that the boy landed in Montana on the hurricane deck of a freight, as "blind baggage" until the day when he proudly stood before the congress of the United States and pleaded so eloquently that his bill was passed without one negative vote.

In 1928 young Gigliotti made another trip to the United States, this time as honor guest of the American Legion and the city of Philadelphia. He had enrolled 1,350 members of the Legion in Italy, thereby winning the Legion award for having broken all membership records. At the Sesqui-centennial exposition he was awarded the Legion medal and was royally entertained by the municipality. Converted. While he was attending a race meeting in Canby, a strange thing happened. One Sunday he stood on the edge of a curbstone idly listening to the sermon of a street preacher. Nobody will ever know just what happened, but he was converted. He returned to Miles City, determined to get an education and to fill a more important place in society than that of a jockey. He joined the church at Miles City, found many friends and spent several happy years in that place. He decided to study for the ministry. On April 3, 1917, he enlisted in the First Division, "Pershing's Own." He was wounded three times in action, and his most valued "souvenir de la guerre" is a piece of shrapnel in his skull, just over his right eye. After the war he continued his studies for the ministry and was ordained into the church and took charge of an Italian mission in Schenectady, N. Y. Here he married Miss Maybelle Prasad, a teacher and Columbia graduate.

With the help of the Veterans' Bureau, he traveled to Rome. He studied at the Methodist college on Monte Mario for a year, and then was made instructor in history and economics.

Now he began to do things. While in Rome he was instrumental in having a bill put through our congress for the repatriation of nearly ten thousand Italians who had fought for the United States during the war.
