LAST RITES SAID FOR MRS. WATERBURY

WOODBURN, Jan. 29.—(Special)—Funeral services for Mrs. Martha C. Waterbury, 53, who died in Portland Friday, were held Sunday afternoon from the Methodist Episcopal church with the Rev. A. J. Neufeld officiating. Interment was in Belle Passi cemetery.

Music was furnished by a quartet consisting of Mrs. P. L. Love, Mrs. A. J. Neufeld, J. H. Livey, and Sam Berger.

Martha Comfort Schooler was born in Chillicothe, Missouri, July 21, 1845, the daughter of William and Mary Schooler. When 5 years old she moved to Iowa with her parents, and two years later her mother died. On June 16, 1876, she was married to George Waterbury and later came west. Five children, three of whom survive, were born to this union. The surviving children are Carrie Waterbury, Portland, Mrs. W. J. Wilson, Woodburn, and W. H. Waterbury, Toledo. Eight grandchildren and one great grandchild also survive her.

Mrs. Waterbury had long been a resident of Woodburn and was a life-long member of the M. E. church. She was an active member of the local church when it was built four years ago she suffered a paralytic stroke and had been an invalid ever since. Last November the family moved to Portland where she lived until her death.

AIMEE IGNORANT ON FINANCIAL AFFAIRS

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 29.—(A.P.)—Aimee Semple McPherson

will delay indefinitely her evangelistic trip to Canada so she can give "all possible help" to the inquiry of the state legislative committee here to determine whether impeachment action should be taken against Superior Judge Carlos Hardy.

Mrs. McPherson testified that the check for \$2500 which she

gave Judge Hardy was a "love offering" as a reward for assistance given to Angelus Temple, of which she is pastor, and for numerous radio talks. She denied that it was a fee for legal services in connection with her kidnapping investigation two years ago.

Her testimony had not been completed this afternoon and she

said she will remain here as long as she is needed. The committee asked her to send for her former secretary, Miss Emma Schaffer, who left for San Francisco this morning.

Mrs. McPherson became silent "by advice of counsel" when members of the committee sought to bring out various angles of the alleged "kidnaping."

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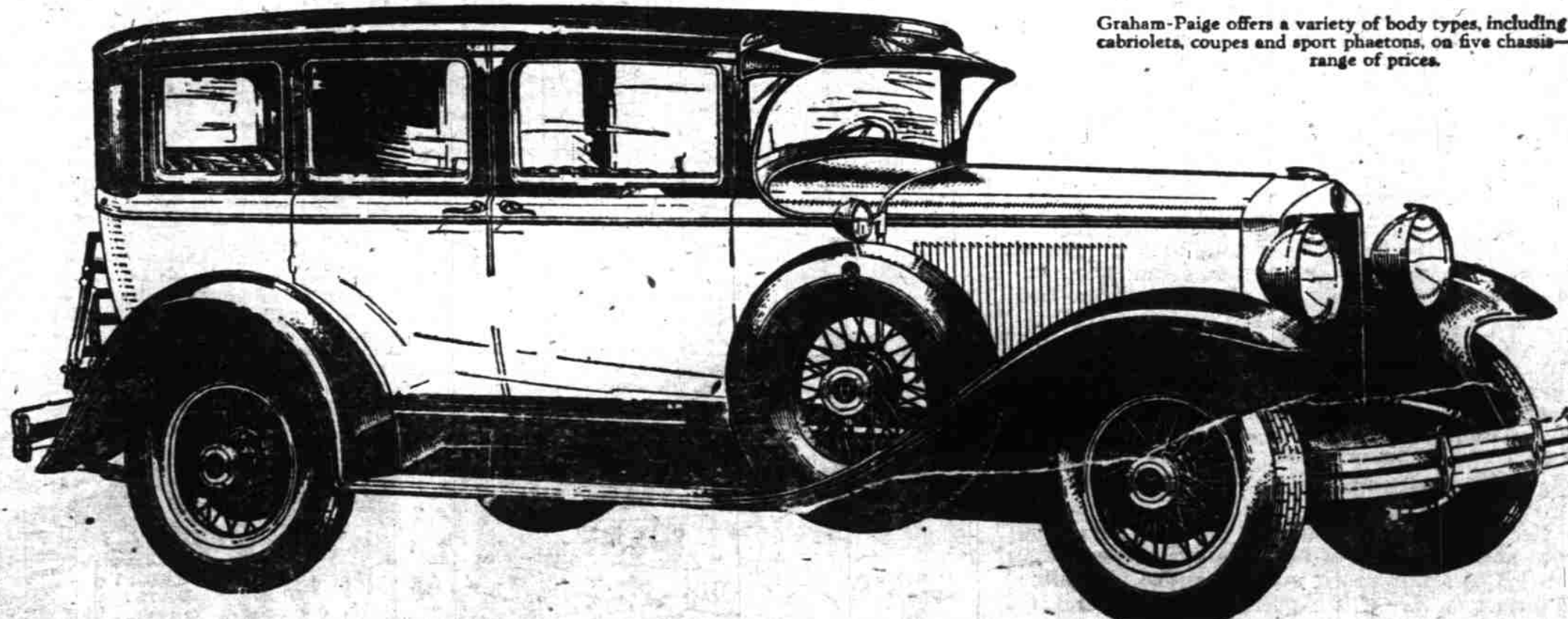


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
