BOOTH ADVISED BY ARCHRISHOP

Prominent British Churchman Tells Salvationist He Should Retire

LONDON, Feb. 2 .-- (AP) - The personality of Baron Davidson, retired archibishop of Canterbury. entered the Salvation Army situation today when it became known hat the aged prelate had sent a letter to General Bramwell Booth. suggesting that retirement would be a good way out of the general's difficulties.

It was at first reported that Baron Davidson might be made a mediator in the dispute betwee: the commander and the high council of the army. But both the international headquarters of the organization and the headquarters of the American delegatio: to the council disclaimed know ledge of any such move. It was indicated that it would hardly be welcome, if made.

The letter from the former archbishop it was said by a high army authority, urged peace of his aged co-worker in religion. The epistle pointed out that the general, like the writer of the letter, whary and tired from the life-long service to humanity. It was therefore met that they should both relinquish their work to younger hands.
