

Webfoots Tear Through Aggie Defense To Win By 30 to 21

Oregon Piles Up 10-Point Lead and Orangemen Fail To Head Off Fast Attack

ORVALLIS, Ore., Feb. 2.—(AP)—The University of Oregon Webfoots galloped to an easy victory over the Oregon State college tonight, 30 to 21. The Webfoots piled up a 10 point lead before the Aggies scored, the score at half time being 20 to 15.

Bill Reinhart, Webfoot coach, shifted his lineup for this northern division of the Pacific coast conference game, placing Eberhart, ex-1928 freshman, at center and Jack Horner, sophomore at forward. Everhart was the keyman on the attack in the first half and when Gordon Ridings, veteran forward who led the northern conference scores last fall, went into the game late in the initial period, the Oregon team started a scoring rampage.

Oregon State used two complete quintets in the first half in an effort to stop the Oregonians but not one of the combinations of Stats G.H. coach used could turn the trick. Conversion of fouls favored the Oregon marksmen and connected for eight while the best the Oregon State could do was one.

The two teams will meet in Eugene Saturday.

TECHNICAL POINTS IN RADIO TALKED

WASHINGTON, Feb. 2.—(AP)—The opinion that the Universal Wireless company of Buffalo could do technically all it claimed with the 46 short wave lengths recently granted it by the Federal Radio commission was expressed today by the commission's radio adviser in testimony before the house Merchant Marine committee.

The witness was Lieut. Commander T. A. M. Craven, a radio expert loaned to the commission by the navy department to advise on technical matters. He appeared to discuss a recommendation he made to the commission that careful consideration be given to the universal application because the company had developed a method of close separation of radio channels which increased the number of radio frequencies and facilities.

The short wave lengths were granted for use in point to point domestic radio communication service.

SORDS POINTS All Strokes the Same to This Little Star

Eleanor Holm, little New York swimming sensation, has accomplished such aquatic feats in recent months as to place her at the top among women in all-around competition.
In winning the metropolitan senior 300-yard medley championship recently, Miss Holm displayed her ability as an all-around star. This event calls for three 100-yard swims of breast, back and crawl strokes, in order. Her time for the complete distance was 4:22 3-5, which broke her own world's record of 4:26 1-5. She covered the breast stroke 100-yard stretch in 1:26 1-5, a remarkable speed for a 75-foot pool.
Her ability has swimming experts guessing as to how such a little mite of a girl can attain such speed. She tips the scale a little better than 100 pounds and is only 15 years old.

BOOTH ADVISED BY ARCHBISHOP

Prominent British Churchman Tells Salvationist He Should Retire

LONDON, Feb. 2.—(AP)—The personality of Baron Davidson, retired archbishop of Canterbury, entered the Salvation Army situation today when it became known that the aged prelate had sent a letter to General Bramwell Booth, suggesting that retirement would be a good way out of the general's difficulties.

It was at first reported that Baron Davidson might be made a mediator in the dispute between the commander and the lay council of the army. But both the international headquarters of the organization and the headquarters of the American delegation to the council disclaimed knowledge of any such move. It was indicated that it would hardly be welcome, if made.

The letter from the former archbishop it was said by a high army authority, urged peace of his aged co-worker in religion. The epistle pointed out that the general, like the writer of the letter, weary and tired from the life-long service to humanity. It was therefore met that they should both relinquish their work to younger hands.

Baron Davidson, it was said, described the happiness which he was enjoying in retirement and suggested that General Booth also could find joy and beauty and peace if he would give up his active work.

The letter was said to be lengthy but there was no information given out as to its text. The family of General Bramwell Booth declined to comment about it and so did Baron Davidson.
