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the responsibility alone, and will do the best he can with it, notwithstanding he explained to the commission when the measure was drafted that the bill was indefensible and that the offset was unscientific.

Shumway Leaves Bill To Die Natural Death

A. R. Shumway of the grange legislative committee, who was a member of the Carlin committee is here and is keeping his hands off this bill as is also George Palmister, master of the state grange. They think the bill is no good and that it will sink if left alone. It is possible that when the bill is sent to committee that the grange or someone may offer amendments such as revision of the rates and exemptions and elimination of the property offset until the bill, as amended and altered, will resemble the pet income tax bill which the state grange has twice submitted to the people through the initiative.

It has been the understanding that the grange will not ask the legislature this session to pass an income tax bill, as the organization is making time.

Proposal Constitutes Loss of Tax Measures

With the income tax measure the chain of bills of the property tax relief commission is rounded out. There has been delay in presenting it as it was feared that the equalization program and excise tax bill get a substantial start first. At a meeting yesterday of Carlin with C. C. Chapman, L. B. Smith, J. A. Smith, Arthur C. Sweeney and Mr. Shumway it was agreed that there should be no further wait as it might arouse criticism.

The excise tax on banks, financial corporations and business is almost certain to pass. The last public hearing was held Wednesday night. All concerns interested in the excise tax and affected by it have had opportunity to express themselves and now that the last hearing has been disposed of, the bill will soon come out of committee and come up for third reading in the house.

In due time, a hearing will be called for the proposed income tax with property offset, more as a matter of form than anything else, for at two such hearings called in Portland there was such a lack of interest that the commission practically sat alone. In its introduction form the bill is as good as dead already.

INDUSTRIAL PLANT APPROVAL IS GIVEN

SENATORS APPROVE FREE RIDE MEASURE

Entertaining a full gallery in the senate Thursday, a fight developed over Senator Upton's bill authorizing railroads operating in Oregon to give free transportation or reduced rates to members of the Grand Army of the Republic, disabled soldiers and secretaries of commercial organizations and chambers of commerce, was placed on third reading. The bill passed 19 to 10.

"In view of the abuse of the pass system in previous years," said Senator Eddy, "it would have been better had not some of the heads of our educational institutions been included among those now receiving reduced rates on the railroads."

Senator Eddy made it plain that he intended to vote against the bill regardless of the fact that he had been requested to support it by the secretary of the chamber of commerce of which he is a member. He said he was not opposed to free transportation or reduced rates for members of the Grand Army of the Republic and disabled soldiers. Senator Moser said the bill was not a new one but merely extended to three classes of citizens concessions now enjoyed by a large number of persons. In explaining his vote Senator Moser said he favored the bill because representatives of the railroad had lobbied against it. It previously had been charged by Senator Strayer that the bill was favored by the railroad corporations and might lead to serious abuses.

Too Late To Classify

Approved by the senate Thursday, Feb. 7, 1929, the bill authorizing the state chamber of commerce to continue its work for the year 1929-30 was passed.

The senate Thursday adopted Representative Norvell's house resolution authorizing an investigation of the Waverly Baby home by the state fire marshal. Reports received by the ways and means committee indicated that the institution was not equipped with adequate fire escapes. The fire marshal would report to the directors of the baby home.

A delegation of mining men from Baker and Grants Pass is here to ask for a mineral survey of the state. They will ask for an appropriation of \$35,000 which will be matched by the government through the geological survey.

With the exception of a bill providing for the licensing of smelt fishermen, measures being sponsored by the Multnomah anglers and hunters club will not be considered by the Multnomah county joint legislative delegation. It was decided Thursday. The reason given was the delegation will not depart from its decision to consider only measures that exclusively affect Multnomah county. The smelt bill will be introduced by the delegation. It was voted.

Inspection of dairies and dairy barns should be placed under the jurisdiction of the livestock sanitary board, and not with the state dairy and food commissioner, according to a resolution adopted by the Willamette Valley Veterinary Medical association here Thursday. It was said that the inspection was not conducted by the same men who make the tuberculosis tests.

A house concurrent resolution was introduced Thursday by McCourt directing the State Highway commission to designate some suitable and appropriate tract lying along and adjacent to the Columbia River highway in recognition of the services of Samuel C. Lancaster in laying out the highway. The resolution stated that the beauty and utility of the highway were due to his engineering skill. The tract would be known as Lancaster park.

Continued cold, clear weather and easterly winds were predicted by the local weather bureau for tonight and tomorrow. It was expected the temperature would get down to about 16 above zero early tomorrow morning.

A purse snatcher was reported to be operating in Salem Thursday, by Dorothy E. Hubbard, who told the police that a man seized her purse out of her hands and disappeared with it. SOLONS AWAIT PHONE INQUIRY

Burdick and Harlan Both Have Chips on Shoulders; Fight Looms

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Governor Patterson. It looks as though the telephone imbroglio will be spicy and spectacular, approaching the crisis Monday evening.

Grange May or May Not Enter Argument

Mr. Harlan, immediately upon arrival, sought out George Palmer, master of the state grange. Whether the grange will be dragged into the complicated mess remains to be seen. The reason Harlan will appear Monday night is because he has been invited, he said, by two members of the state senate, whose identity he refused to disclose.

Personally, explained Harlan, he is not strong for the home rule idea, as he favors a national investigation. But he believes that if the home rule is adopted, it should apply to light and power companies as well as telephones. He so recommended to the city council of Portland.

If Harlan has a chip on his shoulder, so has Burdick, but not the same chip.

Burdick Denies That Os West Wrote Bill

"Oswald West did not write my home rule bill, as some people are saying," declared Burdick. "Monday night I'll tell all. This is not belong but the real goods. I waited for two weeks for something to be done, and as no one else acted, I sent in the home rule measure."

The people of Portland are entitled to know what's going on. I'm going to fight this bill through the house, and I'll get it through."

The mystery of the home rule

bill is still a mystery, but there are some angles which may prove interesting. In the first place the telephone company does not want a national investigation. There are two memorials, one in the house and the other in the senate, asking for a national probe. The senate has passed the Dune memorial, while last night there was a hearing on the house memorial of Carlin, Potter and Hazlett. The telephone representatives told the senate committee that Oregon's public service commission had sufficient power to fix and regulate rates.

Burdick Tosses Wrench Into Machinery

Such was the situation when out of a clear sky came the home rule bill of Burdick, carrying the idea recommended in a report to the legislature written by A. E. Clark, of Portland, Messrs. Carlin, Potter and Hazlett, on the committee with Clark, had not been consulted about introducing a home rule bill by Clark.

Oswald West and Burdick are close personal and political friends. West represented the phone company in killing a Dunne telephone memorial two years ago. The city council of Portland last week passed a resolution asking for legislation to permit the city to fix rates. Wednesday, Burdick went to Portland accompanied by Frederick J. Brady, who has been a telephone lobbyist. Mr. Brady is the close political adviser of the city commissioner. When Representative Burdick arrived at the city hall, the door was locked, but a janitor let him in and he had a conference with City Commissioner Pier and Commissioner Mann.

Toll Road Repeal Measure Put Off

The senate Thursday indefinitely postponed Representative Carlin's bill repealing sections of the Oregon laws relating to toll roads.

Test Submarine Towed To Port Given Repairs

KEY WEST, Fla., Feb. 7.—(AP)—The submarine S-4, towed by the tender Mallard, arrived here today for repairs to a leaky periscope, which yesterday caused a halt in the safety tests being conducted near Smith Shoals, off Key West.

Lieutenant Commander P. H. Dunbar, in charge of the operations, said further tests probably would not be made before Monday.

In a series of tests Tuesday and yesterday, Lieutenant C. D. Monson and E. Kalinowski, chief torpedo man, attached to the tender Mallard, succeeded in escaping from the submarine at depths of 40 and 75 feet by using a safety device, and were to attempt the feat at 120 feet when the leak in the periscope was discovered.
