ASTORIA, Feb. 16.—(Special)—Turning back the determined fishermen after they had lunched a terrific last quarter rally, the Salem high school basketball team scored a 23 to 18 victory over Astoria high in a bitterly contested game here tonight.

Salem scored first but Astoria soon regained the lead and held the visitors scoreless for the remainder of the first quarter, which ended 5 to 2. The red and black did even better at the defensive game in the second quarter than Astoria did in the first, limiting the fishermen to one point on a free throw, and at half time the score was six all.

KO CHRISTNER WILL FIGHT FRIDAY NIGHT

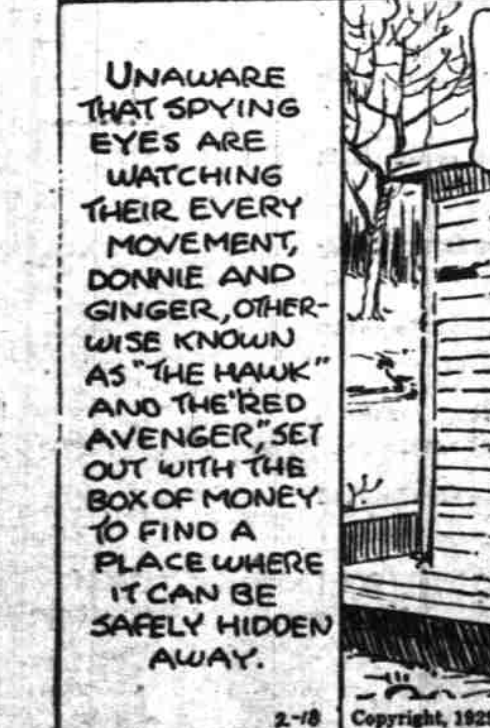

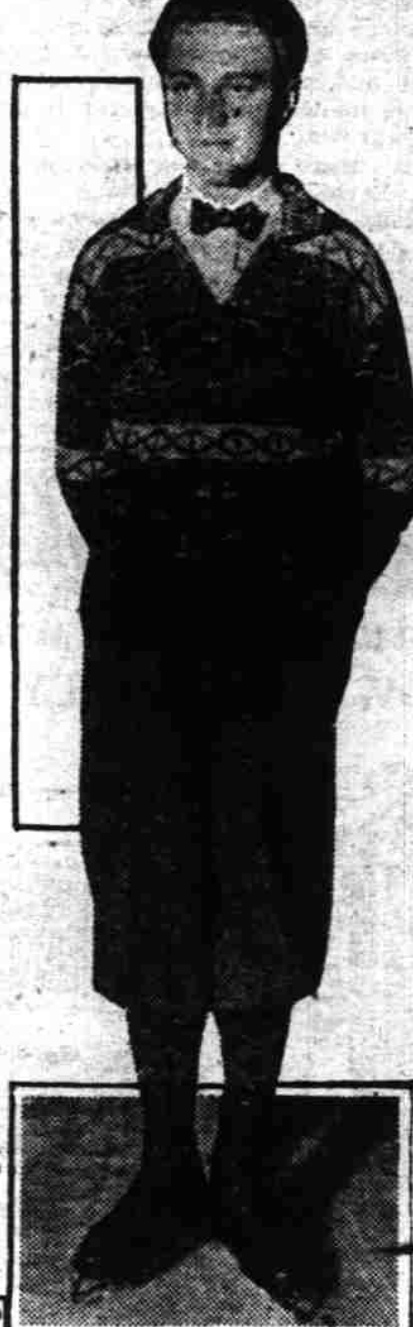
