FRESNO MAKES MAIL EASY TO DISPOSE OF

A. C. Bohrnstedt, Salem realtor who has just returned from a trip to California, has written a letter to C. E. Wilson of the Salem chamber of commerce telling the manner in which the Fresno post office is accommodating auto patrons and which he thinks could be adopted here with much convenience.

Mr. Bohrnstedt points out that at the curb in front of entrance of the Fresno postoffice, itself located in a busy district, has been placed a large mail box for letters and small parcels on which is plainly visible: "Courtesy P. Carlin's Tax On Intangibles Put In To Running

The tax on intangibles, hailed as one of the principal measures of the Carlin program, came into the house late Saturday afternoon. This is the measure that is expected to raise some \$1,000,000 and do it so painless that no one will even be tempted to try to dodge.

Bolled down, the tax will simply be five percent of the income on such intangibles as stocks and bonds. An exemption of \$200 of income is allowed, which means that persons owning bonds yielding five percent could hold \$4,000 worth and be exempt.
