FILIBUSTER IN SENATE LOOMS

Elimination of Dry Fund From Appropriation Bill Brings Threats

WASHINGTON, Feb. 20. (AP)—A decision today by Republican leaders to kill the first deficiency appropriation bill carrying the controversial \$24,000,000 increase for prohibition enforcement drew a threat of a filibuster in the senate against the second deficiency measure which would carry all items of the first except the dry fund.

Acting Chairman Wood of the house appropriations committee announced the plan of the party leadership to put all provisions of the first deficiency measure except the dry fund item in the second deficiency bill now being drawn. It is then intended to draw the \$2,427,000 recommended by President Coolidge for increasing prohibition funds as a compromise on the Harris proposal for \$24,000,000.

Senator Glass, democrat, Virginia, declared in the senate that if the party leadership follows this plan, there will be little opportunity of getting the second deficiency bill through. His declaration was regarded as a threat of a filibuster.

Talk of filibuster filled the air today in the senate with threats against the navy department measure carrying the funds for starting the newly authorized cruiser construction program and against the long pending interior department supply measure. Only seven days remain to the end of the session and leaders realize considerable talk on all of the propositions may block final action on some.

Senator Blaine, republican, Wisconsin, an opponent of the cruiser program, blocked an attempt by Chairman Hale of the naval committee to get up the naval supply bill.

Club Foot. Club foot, if taken in infancy, usually can be corrected by massage and manipulation and by strapping or casts. You should take your child to an orthopedic surgeon. (An orthopedic surgeon is one who specializes in deformities.)

The Acid and Alkaline-Ash Foods. Will you please give a list of foods that cause acid urine, and a list of those that counteract it? "MRS. F."

All foods, after they are digested and absorbed, leave acid or alkaline salts, or are completely burned and so are neutral. The body needs all these types of foods, but the alkaline-ash foods must be taken in larger amounts than the acid-ash foods, for the blood and tissue fluids are faintly alkaline and must be kept so. If there is an excess consumption of the acid-ash foods, the alkalinity may be lowered somewhat, bringing on

caused by the weight of excess fat. I don't know of anything that will restore the tone after the damage has been done. In general, the acid-ash foods are all meats, fish, eggs, prunes, and their flours, breads, plums, plums and cranberries. The alkaline-ash foods are all fruits (except those listed under acid-ash), all vegetables, except sorrel and rhubarb, nuts and milk. The slight acidity of the prunes, plums and cranberries need be taken into consideration only in diseased conditions. The neutral-ash foods are butter, cornstarch, cream, lard, sugar and tapioca (unless taken in excess amounts).

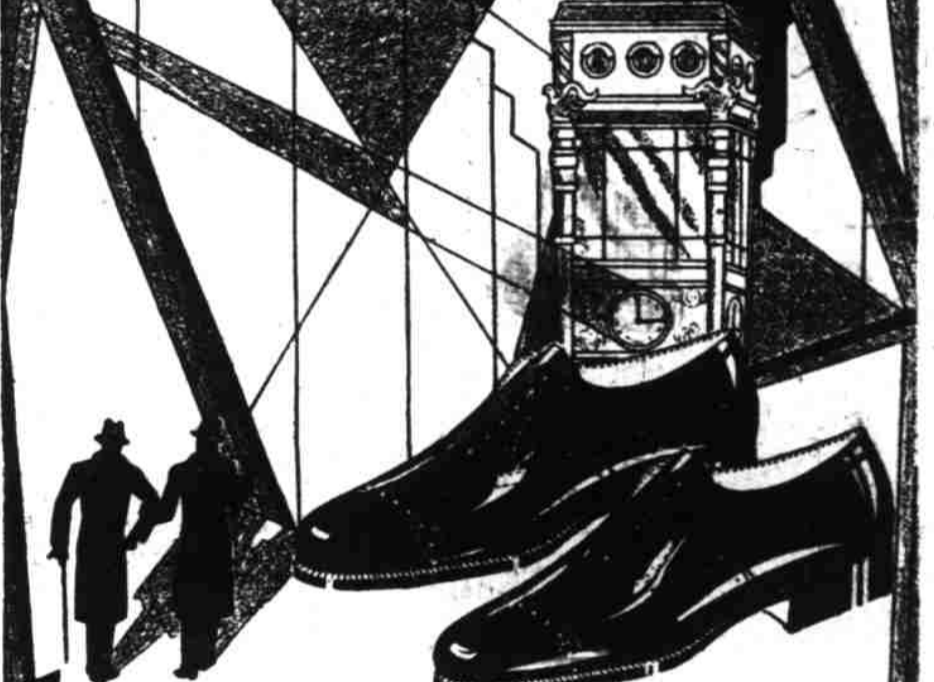
A preponderance of the alkaline-ash foods will lessen the acidity of the urine. Apples, bananas, cow's milk, muskmelon and potatoes have been found to be especially effective. If the urine is acid, considerable water should be taken also.
