Great Secrecy Marks Much of Preliminary Business on Eve of Meet

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be known within a few hours after the stockholders meeting opens. Estimates in the offices today were that Rockefeller would have 4,500,000 votes on his side to 3,200,000 for Stewart. Although the latter may lack a million votes, he will have approximately 30,000 of the 66,000 stockholders in his ranks, including 90.47 per cent of the employee-stockholders of the organization.

Business Performed Behind Locked Doors

Great secrecy surrounded the movements of the company officials and the Rockefeller men today. Conferences were in progress in the various executive chambers, but only an inkling of what was going on behind the closed doors could be had.

E. G. Soubert, president of the Standard of Indiana, was closeted for the better part of the morning with Henry H. Hornbrook, Indianapolis attorney, Richard E. Dwight of New York, representing the law firm of Charles Evans Hughes, and Mr. Aldrich. He emerged with flushed face and serious expression.

Mr. Hornbrook and Mr. Dwight refused to say whether he had been picked by the Rockefeller group for the chairmanship of the board. They were quite willing, however, to say that the slate of directors had been agreed on.

\$680,000 IS READY FOR NEW BUILDING

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Joined in lobbying against the repeal bill and it was killed. Original plans of the board of control call for a \$600,000 building but these plans have been modified to make the building a \$680,000 structure leaving approximately \$100,000 to be used for the purchase of the state printing and auto license building erected last summer. This was made possible because of the recent destruction of the old boys' state training school which was to have been converted into a branch prison.

Women in Auxiliary Prison Under New Plan

The administration building will be equipped for offices, and will house the women prisoners. Cells also will be installed in the structure for more than 200 men. The legislature also appropriated funds with which to complete a two-story garage at the prison. The upper floor of this building also will be arranged to house approximately 125 trusty prisoners.

It was said that these improvements will forestall the erection of a new penitentiary for at least four years.

Under present plans farming operations at the old boys' school will be carried on by a few trusty convicts.

LINDSEY-TULLY IN NO-DECISION FRAY

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speakers, declared that the "measure of democracy" measured by the degree to which the majority will allow the minority to express its opinion." He added that the purpose of the debate was not to explode a theory but "to stir all to think intelligently on the subject under discussion."

Judge Lindsey came quickly to the point when he got on his feet by stating that divorce is on the increase and that he was against divorce. He would have what he termed a "house of human welfare" in which the troubles causing such an alarming increase in divorce could be talked over and corrected if possible; Lindsey would not allow a divorce before three months of probation had been tried during which time the troubles of the two people involved would be properly studied so that if possible the parties involved might "change lives instead of partners."

Judge Lindsey said in speaking of the term companionate in the animal kingdom there is only a temporary mating, there is no real companionship. Companionate conditions are found only in the civilized, church marriages among people. The term is not my term. It is the church's term. I am not advocating a new plan but simply legalizing control of some practices practiced under the modern marriage in order to make decent some of its practices.

Proposes to Take Out Bootleg Knowledge

Lindsey continued, "I would take out the bootleg element of the knowledge which makes for birth control as it is practiced today. I would make scientific and regulated the information on this subject so that it might become a democratic matter and done scientifically to meet economic, social and personal needs."

In speaking of this regulation Judge Lindsey said, "I have no

sure-all, no panacea, God forbid! but simply an improvement of the present day customs of modern marriage. I believe in educating youth for parenthood, and parenthood of youth."

Judge Lindsey made it plain that he held the church in reverence. His quarrel with the church he said was that it was trying to fit 16th century methods to 20th century life. He expressed the opinion that in the church there are the progressive and the reactionary, but with the progressive he was united in opinion but that he did not agree with the reactionary elements who believed in coercion, fear and artificial restraint.

Weaknesses Found

Six weaknesses in the companionate marriage plan were outlined by Dr. Tully in his principal address.

Family responsibility is ignored, an unjust burden in birth control is placed upon women, and an unnatural and harmful situation is created by the allowing of married people to maintain separate residences, he declared. Furthermore, right of physical relations without economic responsibility along with easy divorce at the request of either party, was declared equally dangerous by Dr. Tully. He also found fault with Judge Lindsey's plan on the grounds that companionate marriage ended when the wife bore children, and the speaker emphasized that marriage other than the companionate form, thus became dependent on the accident of a wife's bearing of child.

Objectives of principle were added to Dr. Tully's opposition to the judge's proposal. Companionate marriage, he averred, would encourage child marriage and thus hinder long childhood, a condition recognized as valuable. Similarly, companionate marriage would interfere, Dr. Tully declared, with long training for adolescents and would violate the fundamental law that the higher the power in a person, the more need of its control.

Marriage Basis Outline

Happy marriage according to Dr. Tully, depends alike on comradeship, economic partnership, children and sex, the latter being the only basis emphasized by Judge Lindsey, according to his opponent.

In his rebuttal Tully asked seven questions in writing of Lindsey, but the latter through oversight or desire, failed to answer them. The minister suggested eight methods for improved present marriage standards including in his proposals the suggestions that banns be published for a period of three weeks before impending weddings.

LANDSLIDE FATAL TO 100 PERSONS

LISBON, Portugal, Mar. 6. (AP)—A dispatch from Funchal, Madeira Islands, today said that more than 100 persons were killed and numerous others injured by a big landslide in the valley of St. Vincent. Many of the victims were buried in their homes. The slide resulted from recent torrential rains.

Nine houses in which 100 persons were crowded fell with the landslide into a flooded river. All were carried out to sea by the swift current.

Five bodies were recovered. Volunteers were organized for further relief work. These efforts were seriously impeded by frequent smaller landslides.

END OF REVOLT CLOSE AT HAND

Rebels Losing Out All Along Line, Government Bulletin Asserts

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rebels of the third battalion. He will be able to reach Vera Cruz without difficulty and thus the pacification of the entire state will be consummated."

As a result of a day of reported federal successes, the Mexican government has announced an early resumption of train service from Mexico City to the Texas border.

A newly critical center developed on the northern border with indications of a coming rebel attack on Juarez, opposite El Paso, Texas.

Monterey has been retaken by the swift driving march of five federal columns, Mexico City officials claimed last Wednesday. General Escobar's rebel troops were driven out before they had a chance even to consolidate their position.

Vera Cruz will share a like fate within three days federal authorities said.

Rebels Organized Well In North

The revolutionists are acting as one unit in the north where loyal troops are still widely scattered and generally outnumbered. Where the federals have had a chance to strike, as at Vera Cruz, they have hit the revolution heavy blows.

A battle was imminent for Juarez, across the boundary from El Paso, and rebel leaders said it fell was only a matter of hours. The city was feverishly excited. Machine guns were mounted at strategic points and civilian troops patrolled the streets.

A detachment of several hundred federal troops left Juarez for the north Tuesday night to meet advancing rebels. It was persistently rumored that they were about to clash at Samalayuca, 23 miles to the south.

Federal Troops Flee to Mountains

Rebel successes were reported everywhere in the north from Guaymas on the Gulf of Lower California to eastern Sonora. Isolated bodies of loyal troops have taken to the mountains. Guaymas has been captured by the rebel general Manzo, together with the Mexican warship Bolivar lying in the harbor. The federals were apparently employed from Mazatlan and closed the telegraph offices.

Only municipal authorities were left in Mazatlan, the fall of which would open the way for a rebel march down the west coast of Mexico to outflank the capital itself.

Many of the experts on the commission believe that this central organization should be situated in a neutral country and be itself neutral in personnel. This presupposes, however, that there will be a final agreement between Germany and her creditors, something which is not in sight at this moment.

The whole subject with which the experts are dealing seems to be turning on discussion of arrangements for administration of reparations payments and marketing of bonds. Until this has been settled there probably will be little progress toward a final decision as to the total that Germany must pay and as to how many years these payments shall be spread.

Despite efforts of the experts to keep political aspects of the subject out of their deliberations, that phase seems to have penetrated the discussions. Some neutral observers remarked today that no other hypothesis would explain why the commission, after sitting more than three weeks, has not been able to report any actual progress toward settlement.

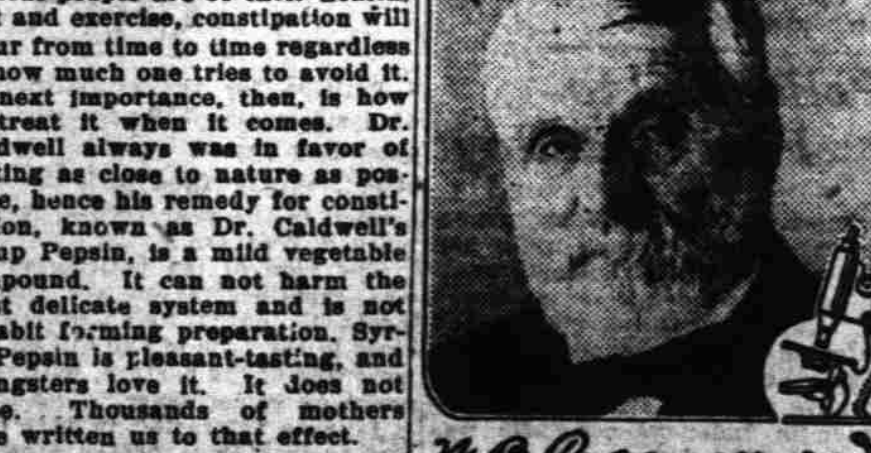

United States Officials Study Mexican Conditions

WASHINGTON, Mar. 6. (AP)—Developments in revolution torn Mexico were studied today by United States government officials who are watching carefully the tide of rebellion and its effect on the vast American interests in that country, estimated at \$2,000,000,000.

Ambassador Morrow at Mexico City continued to keep Secretary Kellogg fully informed on all phases of the revolution.

There was nothing in the reports reaching Washington to cause apprehension among officials over the safety of American interests as the revolutionary forces have threatened no American citizens.

State department officials during the day denied having made any announcement that the American government would furnish the Mexican government, upon solicitation, with arms and facilities.

The federal government's recapture of the city of Monterey from the revolutionary forces was regarded in Washington as probably a turning point in the revolutions. The state department was informed that no American residents of Monterey were harmed when the rebels took the city.

U. S. Troops Line Border

Along the Mexican-American border there are more than 7,500 American troops ready to protect the American cities near the boundary in case they are threatened as a result of fighting.

Major General William Lasater, commander of the 8th corps area at San Antonio, and Major General John L. Hines, commander of the 9th corps area, at San Francisco, who control troops in the border states, have full authority to dispose their forces as they deem necessary without consultation with the war department.

Thus far there has been quiet along the border and no necessity for precautionary measures on the part of the commanders.

AMERICAN FORMULA FOR COURT SET OUT

Associated Press Receives Draft of Paper Prepared by Elihu Root

GENEVA, Mar. 6. (AP)—The Associated Press tonight received the text of the already famous formula prepared by Elihu Root as a method for bringing about admission of the United States to the world court of international justice.

Statesmen gathered at Geneva for the council meeting of the League of Nations have discussed the formula and agreed that it formed a good basis for further consideration of the reservations made by the United States senate and which hitherto have not been accepted by other nations.

The formula is entitled "a suggested redraft of article IV, of the protocol of 1926." It should be read in the light of that protocol which was drafted by a conference of signatories to the international court.

That conference rejected the fifth American reservation, declining to give the United States an unrestricted veto privilege on advisory opinions by the court when the American republic found itself especially an American injection the same force and effect as would attach to a vote of a league member in either the assembly or the council of the league.

The idea behind this was that the signatories to the court did not know whether opinions should be requested from the tribunal by a majority or by an unanimous vote of the league council.

BOULDER DAM PACT IS BEING RATIFIED

DENVER, Colo., Mar. 6. (AP)—With the ratification today by Utah of the six states Boulder Dam pact, and the ratification of the same pact last week by California, construction of Boulder Dam may soon be started.

Under the terms of the Swing-Johnson bill, which proposes construction of the dam and which has been passed by congress and signed by the president, immediate construction of the dam was to start if seven states, Arizona, Utah, Nevada, California, Colorado, Wyoming and New Mexico, ratified a compact agreeing on water rights and other problems brought up by the dam. Six of the states have ratified this compact but Arizona has refused her signature.

Under the same bill construction of the dam would start after the elapse of a six months period during which a seven state agreement was not reached if six states ratified a six state compact.
