# Salem High Looms as Easy Winner in District Tourney

Disharmony Among District Officials Reaches Climax Wednesday

The Salem high school basketball team loomed as an almost certain winner in the district tournament here, as eight teams p.epared for the competition opening this afternoon which will determine the district 7 entry in the state tournament next week.

Oregon City high is to be Salem's opponent in the final first round game tonight at 8:30 o'clock. This is expected to be the local team's hardest game, yet comparative scores do not indieate that the Clackamas county team will be an especially formidable opponent.
