

WASHINGTON, Mar. 12: (AP)-Calling attention to attacks made on the Indian bureau because of poor living conditions among the 350,000 Indians in the country, Dr. M. C. Guthrie, chief medical director of the bureau, today issued a statement covering the difficulties which beset the bureau in its relief work.

Dr. Guthrie said health problems of the Indians ware common "to any people where ignorance, superstition and poverty prevails and makes difficult or prohibits the introduction of established measures because of lack of facilities to carry out such measures and a trained personnel who are content to live under conditions of isolation and at times actual hardship."

Tuberculosis was listed as the most important cause of death among the aborigines, with the death rate from this disease is estimated at more than four times that among whites. This was said to be the result of poor economic status, unhygienic living conditions, and lack of an adequate




