The No. 5 air mail envelope, with the 5 cent stamp, will cost \$1.70 per thousand.

OUT WALKED 'NEGRESS'

Dainty Feline Spent Cosy Night in Her Steel Bedroom

And when they opened the city hall vault Wednesday morning, "Negress" stepped forth as unconcerned as though she had not been a prisoner in solitary confinement for 15 hours.

"Negress" be it understood, is the dainty feline mascot of the Salem police department. She is coal black except for a tiny spot of white on her neck.

Made Safe at Home—Six weeks or more ago "Negress" attached herself to the police department when her former home, one of the old frame apartment houses opposite the city hall on Chemeketa street, was torn down. Since then she has crossed the path of every policeman on the force, but they loyally contend that it means good luck, not bad.

Tuesday night she was missing. When her absence lengthened into hours, the sergeant on duty

switched on the red lights and told all the patrolmen, and a city wide search was instituted, all to no avail.
