

48 Students Get Diplomas From Monmouth Normal

ADDRESS GIVEN BY DR. KANTNER

Life of Teacher Praised in Speech; Dean Hands Out Diplomas

MONMOUTH, Mar. 21.—Graduation exercises were held at 11 o'clock Tuesday morning in Oregon Normal school auditorium for 48 students who have completed the diploma requirements this term. A short program began with a piano solo by Ralph H. Aldred, pianist for the normal symphonic orchestra and MacDowell club.

Dr. W. C. Kantner, Salem, delivered the commencement address, in which he touched upon the active, constructive life work of a teacher, and the high standard of service which teaching exacts. Dr. Kantner had been invited to address the students at convocation on Washington's birthday, the program being set aside, finally, in favor of a fall holiday instead for the normal school.

The speaker included some interesting detail which he had assembled for the February occasion, including mention of Washington's visit to the home of Betty Ross to view the first official American flag.

President Landers gave a brief charge to the class; and, following a traditional custom, the diplomas were presented by Dean J. E. V. Butler. Music by the normal orchestra directed by William Frederic Gaskins concluded the program.

Approximately 50 per cent of these year's students have earned their own way through school and fully 25 per cent of the graduating group have earned all or part of their expenditures.

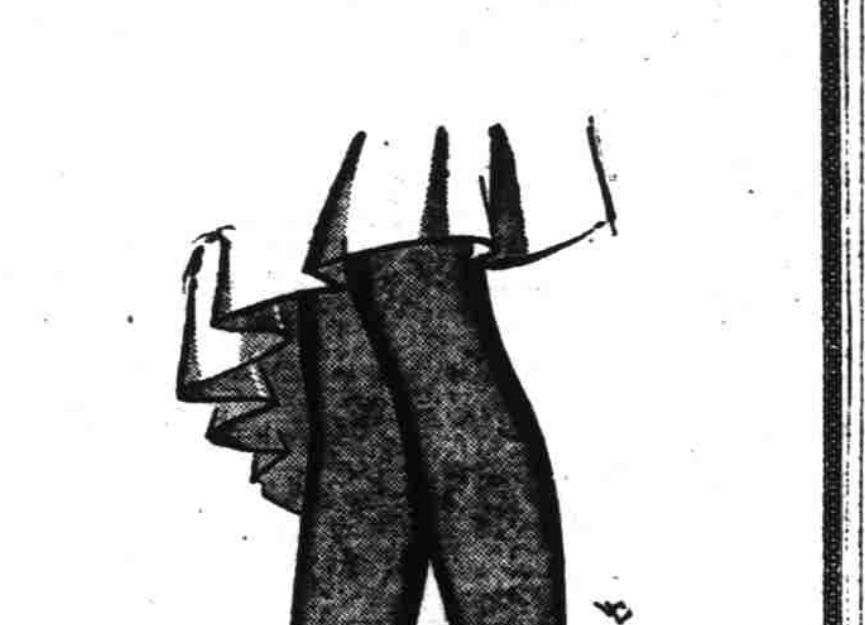
New City Hall is Monmouth Plan; Bond Vote is Up

MONMOUTH, March 21.—Monmouth's city council passed an ordinance Wednesday night which authorizes a bonding issue of \$15,000 for the purchase of fire equipment and for construction of a fire hall and city office building, 40x60, and referred it to the voters of Monmouth for approval at a special city election to be called May 7.

This measure has been under consideration since January 1. The building specifications, as planned, include a city recorder's office, a council chamber, a city jail, a storage room for equipment and trucks, and a club room with lockers and showers for use of the department members.
