His last week, known as "Passion Week," is full of interesting events. The story of these few days is recorded in all of the four gospels and constitutes about one-third of them. It is a most tender story, full of pathos, and has in it a new interpretation of life and death.

The fame of Jesus had spread everywhere—he was known far and wide for the wonderful things which he did and for the words which he spoke. They were asking the question, "Will he come in the feast?" Many friends were there who wanted to see him. His popularity is seen when the vast multitude went to meet him, casting the branches before him and singing their Hallelujahs as they bring him into the city. Lazarus of Bethany only a short time before this had won for him many friends and they were testifying to his greatness.

FIRST M. E. GIVES HOLY WEEK PLANS

Special Communion Service Will be Held Thursday Night

A series of religious services will be conducted in the First Methodist church in the annual observance of Holy Week. **Seven Sayings Given**  
The devotional studies for the week will be on the "Seven Sayings of Christ." Each evening during the week will be read by the church members. Subject of each day's study is found in the following sayings, accompanied by explanation:  
Monday—"Father, forgive them; they know not what they do." Luke 23:34. The love of Jesus was so great that he could pray for the forgiveness of those who nailed him to the cross. In these words are suggested God's fatherhood; forgiveness of sins and the ignorance of those who put Him to death.  
Tuesday—"Verily I say unto thee, today thou shalt be with me in Paradise." Luke 23:43. These words were addressed to the thief hanging by his side. Regardless of the past of this man, Jesus knew that his heart hungered for God. The prayer of man's extremity brings God's opportunity.  
Wednesday—"Woman, behold thy son; Behold thy mother." John 19:26, 27. These words show the solicitude of Jesus for his mother. To John was committed a sacred trust and responsibility. Fellowship with Jesus means loving one another on earth.  
Thursday—"My God, my God, why hast thou forsaken me." Matt. 27:46. Here may be seen the great suffering of the Savior and the price paid for our redemption. Pain may appear the master, the spirit but the spirit conquers in the end.  
Friday—"I thirst." John 19:28. This was the last request for the body that Jesus made. He thirsted and they gave him vinegar to
