highway department. Years ago, he was known in the prize ring as "Battling" Bozeman. His affidavit said: "Huey P. Long sent for me to come to the governor's mansion about five or six weeks ago. The governor said to me, 'Battling Bozeman, I am the kaiser of this state. When I crack my whip, whoever dares to disobey my orders, regardless of what they may be, I'll fire 'em. They won't last as long with me after disobeying as one of my first commands as a snowball will in hell.'"

Long declared under influence of liquor. "Shut that door over there," he says, the affidavit continued. "Come down here and sit down by me. The governor had been drinking. I smelled it on his breath. "He says 'Battling Bozeman, I am going to call an extra session of the legislature,' and he says 'This blank J. Y. Sanders, I'm going to disapprove of all my measures and I want to get him out of my way. I have chosen you to do away with this blank.' "I says, 'Governor, what do you mean?' "He says, 'I mean for you to kill the blank, blank, leave him in the ditch where nobody will know how or when he got there. "I'm governor of this state, and if you were to be found out I would give you a full pardon and many gold dollars."

Offer Refused. "In about a couple of weeks the governor stopped me on the street while I was here during the week-end, and says to me, 'Well, what about it?' (Sanders) I says to the governor, 'I have given you my final answer to him.' "Very well, remember what I told you. I'm the boss," he roared at me, and turned mad, walking away. "I went on back to New Orleans and after a few days a telegram came from L. R. Ames, saying to pry Bozeman off immediately, right now, not tomorrow."

The resolution, which also went over until tomorrow, directed the appointment of a committee to investigate Bozeman's charges which are the basis of the 19th charge in the impeachment resolution.

The other charges were condensed in the resolution under the heading "guilty of crimes and misdemeanors in office, incompetency, corruption, favoritism, oppression in office and gross misconduct," and eighteen alleged specific instances were cited.

VARSITY WINS OVER WYOMING DEBATERS

Berberman Acts as Critic; Litter of Stanford is Debate Chairman

The Willamette university debate team, composed of Jack Routh and Charles Campbell Tuesday night won the decision of the local jury in a contest with the "Cowboy" team from the University of Wyoming. The decision was won by Professor Berberman of the Oregon Normal school. The Wyoming team opened the discussion of the question of abolishing the plea of temporary insanity by charging that the present system, which allows this plea, makes for slow and cumbersome court procedure. They indicted the testimony usually given by expert witnesses and the jury decisions based thereon. The Willamette team countered with the proposition that the present system is fundamentally sound, and that the Wyoming team had not presented sufficient evidence of abuse of the plea of temporary insanity.

Mr. Berberman, who acted as the judge of the debate, made the charges of the Wyoming team and in addition proposed the famous Massachusetts plan, with provision for abolishing the plea of temporary insanity. The Willamette team closed its argument by also proposing the Massachusetts plan, but retaining the plea and the right to abolish the plea would be unconstitutional.

Berberman Makes Decision. In giving the decision, Professor Berberman pointed out that the team proposing to change the federal constitution had taken a position in which the burden of proof rested on them. The decision was awarded to the Willamette team largely because of clearer presentation of argument and because it stayed closer to the issues of the debate. The Wyoming debaters were expert in debate technique and showed skill in use of debating strategy.

The debate Tuesday night attracted the largest attendance of any of the university debates this season. Robert Littler, former student at Willamette university, now student in the law department at Stanford, was chairman. Mr. Littler was a former Willamette debater, and at the close of the debate expressed his appreciation of the efforts made by both teams. He will represent Stanford at the meeting of the Pacific Coast Forensic league in the convention to be held at Moscow, Idaho, this week.

Scoutmasters' Training Class Will Open Soon

A scoutmasters' training school for Marion and Polk counties will open in Salem Thursday, April 11, and will be held each Thursday night for a six-week period. O. P. West, new scout executive, announced Tuesday night. The school will be held at the senior high school, from 7 to 9:30 o'clock.

The school will be open to any man over 18 years of age and is designed primarily to train efficient leaders for scout work in this area, as at the present time lack of real scout leaders is hindering work and development in this area. Mr. West will direct the school and will line his faculty up shortly.

MOST SERIOUS CRISIS IS SEEN

Money Shortage Held Worst in Decade; Prices Drop and Then Rebound

will shortly be called upon to meet unusually large April 1 dividend and interest disbursements. The sharp rise in money threw a terrible scare into thousands of small speculators, most of whom had never before experienced a credit crisis, and into some of the large traders as well, with the result that large blocks of stocks were dumped overboard "at the market" in order to conserve rapidly vanishing paper profits, or limit the steadily mounting losses.

Net Loss at Close. Of Day But Slight. The late rally of \$5 to \$26 a share in some of the high priced stocks resulted in relatively little change being shown by the stock market indices. The Associated Press figure for 50 leading industrial fell only 1.2 points, as against 6.5 yesterday while the index of 30 rails dropped only 2.16 of a point although it set a new low level for the year, as a group, the public utilities were the hardest hit, the index of 20 leading issues dropping 4.8 points as against 5.3 points yesterday.

The market had opened fairly steady, with opening prices regular. A rally started soon after the opening but this was checked when the call money renewal rate was posted at 12 per cent. Large offerings then began to appear and prices rapidly melted away, with the selling movement gaining increased impetus from each advance in the rate.

Ticker Falls Far Behind in Reports. Such a gigantic accumulation of orders poured over the brokerage wires from all sections of the country, and by radio and cables from abroad, that the ticker fell hopelessly behind the market. Word came back from the floor around 11 o'clock that the ticker was nearly 25 minutes late. The delay increased to 40 minutes at noon, 55 minutes at 1:30, 64 minutes at 2 o'clock and 93 minutes at 2:50, while the usual last minute rush of buying and selling delaying the printing of the final quotation until two hours and 14 minutes after the market had closed.

PORTLAND, Ore., Mar. 26.—(AP)—Captain Ira Eaker, of "Question Mark" fame, denied here tonight he "drove at a large group of spectators" or did aerial acrobatics over the Oakland, Calif., airport today as charged by Millard Hamilton, department of commerce inspector, who announced the famous flier faces charges of violating air regulations.

REPUBLICAN PARTY REFORMED IN SOUTH

President Hoover Takes Big Step in Changing Conditions in Dixie Land

WASHINGTON, March 26.—(AP)—President Hoover took a sweeping step today in his drive to break up political sectionalism south of the Mason and Dixon line. In his first purely political pronouncement since entering the White House he bluntly informed the old organization in South Carolina, Georgia and Mississippi that they had lost the administration's confidence because of abuse in handling federal patronage and called upon the people of those states to build new organizations. Conversely he commended the leadership in the other southern states on the effort to "broaden the basis of party organization by the establishment of advisory committees of the highest type of citizenship to deal with administrative questions and who will also cooperate with independent democrats."

The organizations the recreation of which was decreed by the president, are headed in South Carolina by Joseph T. Tolbert, for many years national
