

DEATH CLAIMS PIONEER WOMAN

Mrs. DuBois, 70, Survived by 11 Children and 36 Grandchildren

WOODBURN, March 27.—After a prolonged illness Mrs. Doloris DuBois, 70, died Monday at the Vancouver hospital where she was taken three months ago. Funeral services were held in the Catholic church at St. Louis Wednesday morning with Rev. Father Krause officiating, requiem high mass being sung by the St. Luke choir of Woodburn. Interment was in the St. Louis cemetery.

Born in France
Mrs. DuBois was born in France in 1859 and came to Wisconsin early in life. She was a well-known pioneer in the vicinity of Woodburn and St. Louis and has many children living in the valley. She came here 35 years ago with her husband, Joseph DuBois, settling on a farm at St. Louis. Since the death of her husband three years ago, she has been in failing health and finally, three months ago, was taken to Vancouver.
