Home Vegetables on Market

10 Cents a Bunch Brought By Radishes and Onions; Other Products on Market

WITH the advance guard of the home grown vegetables making a showing on the market here already, another week is expected to see considerable change in the vegetable line-up, both as to commodity and price.

Savage's Products Here
Home grown radishes and onions, the product of H. W. Savage on the Garden road, have been on the market for several days although this garden patch is some days ahead of most of the earlier ones, it will not be long before local crops supplant the foreign shipper's. The onions and radishes are 10 cents a bunch.

Local hot house cucumbers are also on the market and are as fine cucumbers as anyone would care to eat. They are expensive, to be sure, at 25 and 30 cents each.

Salsify, better known as vegetable oyster, is an addition to the market supplies. Good sized bunches of the plant cost 10 cents.

First Peas from Hayward
The first peas from Hayward, Calif., are expected for local trade Saturday, with price on the fancy grade to hit 2 1/2 cents a pound. Large fancy celery, scallion stalks and hearts, is also expected for Saturday, the former to sell at 15 and the hearts at 20 cents.

Demand for new potatoes is slow, but the price is down to two pounds for 25 cents. These are shipped in from Texas.

Asparagus offerings are still light, although there is considerable improvement in the quality. The grass comes from California and sells at 30 cents a bunch.

New cabbage, heads of which are larger than offered for awhile, sells at 6 cents.

The first local spinach is offered this week at 10 cents a pound. The quality is excellent and the leaves apparently much more tender than some of the imports.

Other local greens are also offered, including mustard and turnip greens. The latter sells at three pounds for 25 cents.

Endive is also available, at 10 cents a bunch. This comes from vertising club here.

California.

Broccoli in Small Heads
Roseburg broccoli is taking the place of cauliflower and is good despite the small size to which the heads are running. The best grade sells at 20 cents a pound.

Yams, while not plentiful, are sufficient to supply the demand. Price is 25 cents for two pounds.

Carrots are larger than the first arrivals from California and turnips from the south are also making a good showing.

Egg Market Now Steadier; Price 18, 20c a Dozen

With the approach of Easter the egg market has taken a firmer tone, although no great rise has been made during the week. Egg quotations to the producer remained steady Thursday, at 18 and 20 cents. The demand is taking good care of the present supply, and it is probable it will be some time late next month before local handlers begin storage operations for the season.

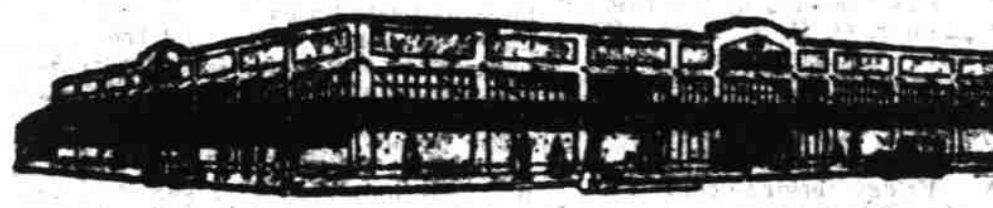
