

**SILK TARIFF MOVE
GAINING MOMENTUM**

PORTLAND, Ore., Mar. 28.—(AP)—The fight being organized by Pacific Northwest lumbermen for import on silk and tea as a protest against the Japanese tariff on lumber gathered momentum today.
Charles S. Keith, president of the Central Coal and Coke company, Kansas City, wired G. E. Dant, vice president of Dant and Russell, large lumber exporters, that he was taking the matter of a retaliatory tariff up with the Southern Pine association.
The wire from Keith came from New Orleans, headquarters of the southern lumber industry. He said he had wired the members of the Missouri delegation in congress asking them to help bring about the writing of a new schedule on silk and tea.
Washington lumbermen in the Puget sound district protest the Japanese lumber tariff which only needs promulgation by the cabinet to become effective.
Dispatches received by Portland lumbermen from Seattle today would act as individuals in the said Washington lumber men fight and not through the West Coast Lumberman's association.
