FEDERALS GET

Rebels Declared Losing Out in Battle With Mexican **Government Army**

(Continued from Page 1.) rebel losses had been, about 300 men on each of the two days of fighting. About their own casual-ties they said little, in fact the only mention since the battle began was made to the press this afternoon. It was said that 25 men of the column lead by Federal General Eulogio Ortiz had died withstanding three cavalry charges launched in rapid succession, beginning at 4 o'clock this morning, by 1,800 insurgent troops.

After turning back these waves of attackers, General Ortiz was reported to have launched a counter offensive and to have gained considerable ground.

Rebels Declared

Trying To Escape The attack on the position of General Ortiz was described by General Calles as a rebel attempt to cut their way out of the trap. The struggle raged for four hours before the insurgents gave up their efforts and retired to new positions, leaving the field strewn with dead and wounded.

General Calles said that simultaneous and later fighting in other sectors had given the loyal troops possession of the major part of the city. The enemy was confined to the railroad station and a small section around it.

General Juan A. Almazan, commanding the federal army was on the firing line in person throughout the day. The headquarters of General Calles were at Bermejillo, about 100 miles southeast of Jimenez.

One One Plane
Flies During Day
The insurgents were reported to have several airplanes, only one of which made a flight today. It sped rapidly northward and several federal planes immediately started in pursuit. The other rebel aircraft remained in a field behind the insurgent lines, covered with tree branches as camouflage while federal aviators endeavored to destroy them with bombs.
