DIPLOMACY IS NEEDED Foreign Delegates Have Real Chance Now GREAT ISSUE INVOLVED

WASHINGTON, April 8.—(AP)—Diplomacy will be needed by socially disgraced Washington while waiting for a decision from Secretary Stimson on the social standing of Mrs. Edw. Everett Gann, states and officially designated hostess of Vice-president Curtis.

This diplomacy ordinarily would be a cautious avoidance by members of the foreign missions of entertaining at the same dinner party Mr. Curtis and his sister and members of either the diplomatic corps or the senate.
