Letter Sent by Governor to Mrs. Walter Denton, State Chairman

MINT CROP SUIT FINISHED TODAY

Circuit Court to Convene at 9:30 to Complete Hearing in \$2933 Case

Circuit court will reconvene at 9:30 o'clock this morning to finish its hearing of the Geelan vs. Eldridge case in which the plaintiffs are asking payment of \$2,933.41 alleged to be due from the defendants for payment in full of an agreement made for crop disposal of mint raised at Lake Labish.

Thursday was taken up with the securing of a jury and testimony of witnesses.

Geelan alleges that he made an agreement with Eldridge to work 20 acres of mint land and to give Eldridge one-half the crop, each party contributing ten acres of land and Eldridge furnishing the mint plants.

Row Develops Over Division of Profit
Dispute arose over the division of the crop receipts, Geelan claiming he failed to receive the one-half portion which was his due under the contract. The defense testimony begun Thursday indicating that Eldridge had made various advances in the way of supplies bought for the plaintiff which were taken out of the monies to be paid Geelan.

WENATCHEE IS APPLE EMPIRE

District Ships 20,892 Cars in Season Just Closed; Output Makes Mark

The Wenatchee, Wash., apple district alone has shipped more apples during the season just closed than any entire state in the union, according to the Northwest Daily Produce News. This district shipped 20,892 cars of apples this year which is more than 1,000 cars above those shipped by Virginia, second largest apple shipping state. The Yakima valley shipped 14,475 cars. Approximately 2,500 cars were loaded from other parts of Washington.

Oregon ranks sixth in the apple shipping list, with 6,309 cars. New York places third, West Virginia fourth and Idaho fifth.

Although the season is virtually over, several foreign countries are asking for the agency or want to purchase American apples.
