"The Broadway Melody," which may properly be called the screen's first musical drama, is an eye-opening, heart-tugging, fascinating entertainment. Sound picture skeptics may go see this picture, now playing at the Elsinore theatre, and be amazed. It is a revelation of what can be accomplished—a portent for the future.

This Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer all-talking film has all the accoutrements of a Broadway musical show grouped about a gripping story of back-stage life, filled with comedy touches. Masterful In
Newest Play

Emil Jannings has played more spectacular roles, but it is doubtful if he ever played one as true to life as the one he was called upon to fill in "Sins of the Fathers," which opened at the Capitol theatre Saturday.

Here he appears as just a common man, unlearned, little given to reflection; a foreigner, limited to lowly walks of life by his broken speech and limited vision. Then, through combination of circumstances which he did little to contrive, incident to the coming of prohibition, he finds himself a "king of bootleggers."

Poison liquor distributed by underlings against his wishes, causes his ruin and the blinding of his pampered but much loved son; and then come the weary years of retribution.

Rarely has the screen combined so powerful a story with a commonplace setting. It is an excellent sermon, but its qualities as an accurate portrayal of life eclipse the moral teaching.

ST. HELENS PULP REPORTS PROFIT

Net of \$390,861 Shown for Year Ending December 31, 1928, by Oregon Plant

The St. Helens Pulp & Paper company showed net profits of \$390,861 for the year ended December 31, 1928, according to a statement issued yesterday through Birch & Co. Profit before charging depreciation, bond interest and federal income tax, was \$622,450.

Current assets on the balance sheet as of December 31 were \$823,395 as against current liabilities of \$279,339. The company has outstanding 15,000 shares of common stock of \$100 par value and \$1,000,000 in first mortgage 6 1/2 per cent bonds. It has authorized 10,000 shares of 8 per cent preferred stock, but none has been issued.

Surplus carried to the December 31 balance sheet was \$610,607.
